Hawaii's agricultural hired work force totaled 6,600 during the April 8-14 2007 survey week, down 3 percent from a year ago. Diversified agricultural workers accounted for 82 percent of all farm labor and at 5,400 workers, it was up 2 percent from April 2006. Pineapple and sugarcane workers were combined to avoid disclosure of individual operations and totaled 1,200 workers (does not include mill or cannery workers) during the April 8-14 2007 survey week, down 20 percent from April 2006.

Average wage rate up 7 percent

The average wage paid to all hired workers during the April survey period was a record-high \$12.85 per hour, 89 cents higher than April 2006. The combined average wage for field and livestock workers also reached a new record high at \$10.77 per hour, up 84 cents from April 2006.

Farms employing from 1 to 9 workers paid an average of \$11.24 per hour for all hired workers, while the combined average wage for field and livestock workers was \$9.92 an hour. ■

U.S. hired workers unchanged from a year ago

There were 961,000 hired workers on the Nation's farms and ranches during the week of April 8-14, 2007, unchanged from a year ago. A large increase in California was enough to offset the large declines in hired workers in most other regions, resulting in a net change of zero from last April. Of these hired workers, 720,000 workers were hired directly by farm operators. Agricultural service employees on farms and ranches made up the remaining 241,000 workers.

Farm operators paid their hired workers an average wage of \$10.17 per hour during the April 2007 reference week, up 39 cents from a year earlier. Field

workers received an average of \$9.35 per hour, up 40 cents from last April, while livestock workers earned \$9.55 per hour compared with \$9.31 a year earlier. The field and livestock worker combined wage rate, at \$9.41 per hour, was up 35 cents from last year.

The number of hours worked averaged 40.6 hours for hired workers during the survey week, down fractionally from a year ago.■
