Number of Hired Agricultural Workers Down 5 Percent

Hawaii's hired agricultural workforce totaled 6,300 workers during the April 6-12, 2008 survey week, down 5 percent from a year ago. Pineapple and sugarcane workers totaled 1,150 workers (does not include mill or cannery workers) during the April 6-12, 2008 survey week, down 4 percent compared to the same week a year ago.

Total farm workforce

Hawaii's total farm workforce is estimated at 10,400 during the survey week of April 6-12, 2008. This was down 1 percent from January 2008 as an increase in the number of self-employed farm operations (up 3 percent) was more than offset by declines in unpaid workers and hired workers in the diversified agricultural sector.

Average wage rate higher than a year ago

The average wage paid to all hired workers during the survey week of April 6-12, 2008 is estimated at \$13.28 per hour. This was 3 percent higher than a year ago. The combined average wage for field and livestock workers is estimated at \$10.91 per hour, up 14 cents per hour from April 2007.

Hawaii farms employing from 1 to 9 workers paid an average of \$11.76 per hour for all hired workers, while the combined average wage for field and livestock workers was \$10.42 an hour. ■

U.S. hired workers down 7 percent from a year ago

There were 919,000 hired workers on the Nation's farms and ranches during the week of April 6-12, 2008, down 7 percent from a year ago. Of these hired workers, 700,000 workers were hired directly by farm operators. Agricultural service employees on farms and ranches made up the remaining 219,000 workers.

Farm operators paid their hired workers an average wage of \$10.60 per hour during the April 2008 reference week, up 40 cents from a year earlier. Field workers received an average of \$9.65 per hour, up

30 cents from last April, while livestock workers earned \$10.32 per hour compared with \$9.59 a year earlier. The field and livestock worker combined wage rate, at \$9.87 per hour, was up 45 cents from last year.

The number of hours worked averaged 41.0 hours for hired workers during the survey week, up 1 percent from a year ago.■
