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Number of Hired Workers Increases 2 Percent

Hawaii's hired agricultural workforce totaled 6,100 workers during the April 12-18, 2009 survey week, up 2 percent from January 2009 but down 3 percent from the same period a year ago. Pineapple and sugarcane workers totaled 900 workers (does not include mill or cannery workers) during the April 12-18, 2009 survey week, unchanged from January's survey week. Other hired workers (livestock, field, supervisors, office workers, etc.) showed a 2 percent increase in April 2009 compared to January 2009's 5,100 workers.

Total farm workforce

Hawaii's total farm workforce is estimated at 10,300 during the survey week of April 12-18, 2009, down 1 percent compared to the same week a year ago and down 2 percent from the survey week in

January 2009. The number of self-employed operators totaled 3,300 during April 2009's survey week, unchanged from a year ago, but down 6 percent from January 2009.

Average wage rate increases

The average wage paid to all hired workers during the survey week of April 12-18, 2009 was estimated at \$13.36 per hour. This was 1 percent higher than a year ago as wage rates increased for all categories of hired workers except for supervisors which were down 1 percent.

Hawaii farms having from 1 to 9 hired workers paid an average of \$10.97 per hour during the April 2009 survey week, while the combined average wage for field and livestock workers was \$10.28 an hour. ■

U.S. hired workers down 2 percent from a year ago

There were 903,000 hired workers on the Nation's farms and ranches during the week of April 12-18, 2009, down 2 percent from a year ago. Of these hired workers, 680,000 workers were hired directly by farm operators. Agricultural service employees on farms and ranches made up the remaining 223,000 workers.

Farm operators paid their hired workers an average wage of \$10.84 per hour during the April 2009 reference week, up 27 cents from a year earlier. Field workers received an average of \$9.99 per hour, up

34 cents from last April, while livestock workers earned \$10.25 per hour compared with \$10.24 a year earlier. The field and livestock worker combined wage rate, at \$10.07 per hour, was up 23 cents from last year.

The number of hours worked averaged 40.1 hours for hired workers during the survey week, down 2 percent from a year ago.■
