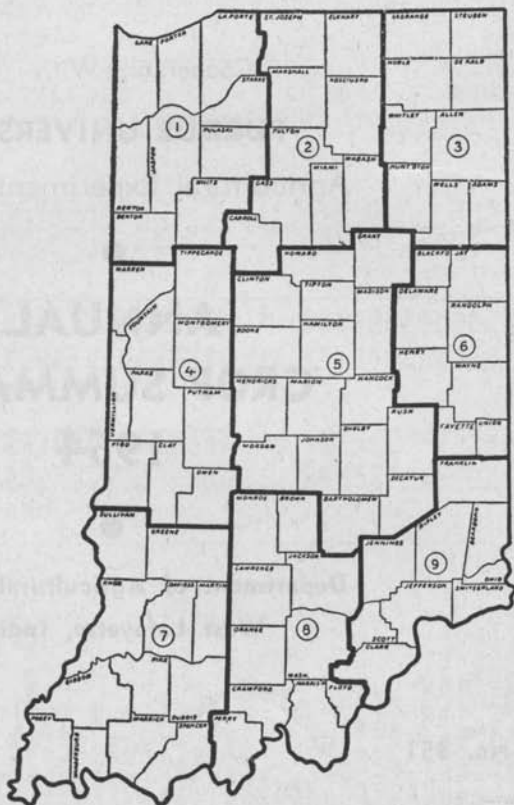

THE 1954 CROP SEASON

THE HARVESTED ACREAGE of Indiana crops in 1954 was about 1 percent less than last year. The marketing quotas for wheat forced wheat acreage down by 21 percent. Restriction of wheat and the need for early pasture and grain resulted in an increase in rye seedings of 66 percent. With little winter damage and a favorable spring, the harvested acreage of rye increased 83 percent. Corn acreage allotments were not as fully followed as were those for wheat, though growers who sell corn reduced their acreages. Growers who expected to feed their corn increased their acreages, so the state acreage of corn was 2 percent larger. The oats acreage was up 8 percent, barley 104 percent and soybean acreage up 6 percent. The acreage of hay harvested was 10 percent less, in spite of a 20 percent increase in alfalfa hay.

CROP YIELDS in 1954 for Indiana were 116 percent of the 1943-52 averages. Vegetable crops for fresh market yielded 108 percent of average, while vegetables for processing yielded 121 percent of average. The only crops yielding less than average were those where most of the acreage is in the southern third of the state. Lespedeza hay, soybean hay, strawberries, sweet potatoes, cantaloups and tomatoes for market made yields below average. New record high yields were made by barley, potatoes, rye, soybeans, tobacco and winter wheat.

ALL SMALL GRAINS made excellent yields. Wheat was consistently good throughout the state. Oats made outstanding yields in the southern part of the state, and good yields elsewhere. Barley was far better than a usual good crop.

THE CORN YIELD for the state was above average. Yields were very good in the northeast, and above average in all of the northern two-thirds of the state. In the three southern districts, the yield was below average, and in the southwest yield was only about 75 percent of average.

SOYBEANS filled unusually well and many new yield records were made by farms and counties in the north to put the state figure slightly above any previous year. The high yield of tobacco seems associated with heavier use of ferti-

lizer. The high yield of potatoes results from a further concentration of acreage on the farms of specialists who fertilize heavily, and are exacting in their cultural practices.

THE CUMULATIVE PASTURE CONDITION of 77 is 92 percent of average. Pasture condition was above average only in May and November.

THE FRUIT CROP was slightly larger than a year ago, with the greatest increase in peaches. Lack of timely rains to carry out full sizing of apples and pears reduced prospects late in the season.

IN THE FALL of 1953, rainfall from August through December was less than half the normal amount. Wheat seeded on plowed ground came up to good stands and a good start. Following soybeans wheat came up slowly and unevenly. The remaining months of wheat growth were subnormal in precipitation by about 25 percent. The lack of moisture limited rust development and since the shortage was not extreme wheat and other fall grains made a wonderful crop. Temperatures were above normal till March. In that month the average was too low to start wheat quickly. April was slightly warm and May slightly cool. June and July were above average, making favorable conditions for maturing and harvest.

THE MOISTURE AND TEMPERATURES favorable for wheat started grass and hay well, but these deteriorated quickly when the higher temperatures of June and July came with continued subnormal precipitation.

THE RELATIVELY DRY WEATHER of May was favorable for planting corn and seeding soybeans. After May—although the state average continued to show subnormal precipitation—there was much variation by districts. In June the northern districts had abundant moisture, the central districts only slightly less than normal, and the southern districts were sharply deficient. Nearly the same pattern continued in July, so early planted corn in the Southwest and South Central districts was severely damaged. The rains were showers with much local variation. August brought very heavy rainfall in the

northern districts and above normal or nearly normal over most of the state. This was very favorable for corn and soybeans that had not advanced too far toward maturity. September was again below normal with the greatest deficiencies in the areas that had greatest moisture in August. Both corn and soybeans matured nicely. Some damage to both crops before

harvest was caused by flooded fields in the north as a result of very heavy rainfall in October.

THE FALL RAINFALL continuing below average over most of the state made mostly favorable conditions for winter wheat for 1955, and yield better than average is expected.

Crop Reporting Districts

In 1953 the numbers of all cattle and milk cows and the numbers of chickens and of turkeys increased. The numbers of hogs, stock sheep, horses and mules declined.

This was the fifth successive year in which cattle numbers increased. For 1953 all cattle were up 3 percent, and milk cows 2 percent. This was the first increase in milk cow numbers in 8 years. Stock sheep numbers declined 2 percent after an increase a year earlier.

The further decrease in hog numbers of 6 percent brought inventory numbers about 10 percent below the 1943-52 average.

The number of horses was down 20 percent from a year earlier, and mules declined 11 percent in the year.

An increase of 5 percent in farm chickens brought the number of birds 3 percent above the 1943-52 average. The increase was mostly in pullets. While turkey numbers were up 45 percent from a year earlier, the total is still 7 percent below the 10 year average.

The value per head declined in the year for all species except hogs and chickens. The yearly declines in percentage were, all cattle 31, milk cows 30, stock

sheep 21, horses 6, mules 7, and turkeys 9. Chickens were unchanged in head value and hogs increased 39 percent.

The total inventorial value of all livestock was \$385,977,000 this year, and \$442,487,000 a year ago. The decline was 20 percent where the year before it was 17 percent.

The 86,000 sheep and lambs on feed was 9 percent less than last year. The 236,000 cattle and calves on feed was 5 percent higher than a year ago.

The annual pig crop was 7,375,000 head saved or 7 percent less than last year. The spring crop was reduced 4 percent, and the fall crop 9 percent.

Broilers produced in Indiana in 1953 were 33,674,000 head, the same as last year. Higher death losses offset larger placements to make little change in production. The average price this year was 27.5 cents per pound or 2.3 cents below 1952. Gross income was \$29,633,000 against \$32,112,000 the previous year.

The lamb crop of 371,000 compares with 321,000 produced in 1952. The wool clip was 3,139,000 pounds against 2,850,000 pounds in 1952.

UNITED STATES

Livestock and poultry on farms and ranches showed a net decrease of 1 percent during 1953. This is the first time since 1949 that the number has shown a decrease. The aggregate for January 1, 1954 is 9 percent below the peak of January 1, 1944. Cattle numbers were up slightly from a year earlier while hog numbers declined sharply. Sheep numbers decreased the second consecutive year while horse and mule numbers continued the decline that has been in progress for many years. Chickens on hand showed a modest increase, while turkeys on hand were about the same as a year earlier.

Feed supplies were generally adequate during 1953 except in the Virginia-Carolina area, the Southern Plains area, and in Missouri, northern Arkansas and adjacent portions of other States. Drought in these areas at various times during the year severely reduced pasture feed, water for livestock and late feed crops. Late in the fall good rains in much of Texas and the Great Plains areas relieved the dry situation. Pasture feed conditions deteriorated during the growing season and in late fall were the poorest in 20 years of record. Most livestock production rates were at record levels during 1953. Producers attained record highs for the number of pigs saved per litter, milk production per cow in herd, the egg laying rate for farm chicken flocks and the weight per fleece for wool shorn.

New high records were established in 1953 for milk and egg production. The 1953 calf crop was the largest on record, while the lamb crop was larger than the 1952 output. Commercial broiler output set a new record high. Commercial hatchery production was at peak activity with a record large output of chicks. The number of turkey poults hatched was down from last year, but the hatch was the second largest on record. The number of chickens raised was about the same as a year earlier, but with more favorable egg prices the number of pullets being kept for layers is considerably larger than a year ago.

Feeding activity by the end of the year was below a year earlier for both cattle and sheep. Financial losses resulting from declining prices during the 1952-53 feeding season were largely responsible for the curtailed feeding this season. On January 1, 1954 the number of cattle on grain feed for market was down 9 percent from a year earlier, while sheep and lambs on feed were down 4 percent. The pig crop, after reaching a post war peak in 1951, has declined each year since and in 1953 was the lowest since 1940. Farrowings were down for both the spring and fall season, compared with both 1951 and 1952. Drought forced liquidation of cattle in some sections of the country. Cattle and sheep inventories were again reduced in Texas, New Mexico and other areas of the Southwest. Heavy selling of steers lowered cattle inventories in the important feeding areas of the Western Corn Belt.

Farmers intended to increase their 1954 spring farrowings by 6 percent. Turkey growers planned to raise 7 percent more turkeys than last year, with a 9 percent increase in light breeds and 6 percent increase in heavy breeds. Farmers also planned to purchase about the same number of baby chicks in 1954 as in 1953. The record cow herd promises another large calf crop in 1954. More milk cows and a slightly larger laying flock in 1954 promise further increases in milk and egg production if the 1953 production rates are maintained.

Although the aggregate number of livestock and poultry declined only 1 percent during 1953 the farm inventory value of \$11.9 billion was 20 percent below a year ago and 39 percent below the record high of \$19.6 billion on January 1, 1952. On January 1, 1954 values per head were lower than a year earlier for cattle, sheep and mules but higher for hogs, horses, chickens and turkeys. Most marked of all were the declines from a year earlier in the average value per head of cattle which was down 28 percent, and stock sheep which was down 12 percent. Average values per head on January 1,

1954 for cattle and sheep are about one-half the values per head in 1952, which were at a record high. On the other hand the average value per head for hogs is the third highest on record.

Inventories of cattle and calves leveled off, showing only a 1 percent increase during 1953. Another million head was added in 1953, following increases of nearly 6 million head in 1951 and again in 1952. The 94.7 million cattle and calves on January 1, 1954 is the largest recorded and marks the fifth successive increase from the recent low point of 76.8 million head on hand January 1, 1949. Commercial slaughter of 35 million cattle and calves during 1953 was also a record high and was 32 percent larger than the previous year.

Hog numbers declined sharply, being 11 percent below a year earlier. The January 1, 1954 inventory number was 48.2 million head, a decrease of 6.1 million head from the previous year. This is the smallest January 1 number since 1938. The decrease in hog numbers resulted from a sharp drop in the 1953 pig crop which was 10 percent below the previous year. Slaughter during 1953 was 14 percent smaller than in 1952.

Total sheep numbers declined for the second successive year. The 30.9 million head on hand January 1, 1954 was 3 percent below a year earlier. The number on feed dropped 4 percent and stock sheep declined 3 percent to 26.9 million head. Although the 1953 lamb crop was 7 percent larger than 1952, it was not large enough to maintain sheep inventories. Increased slaughter resulted from the larger number on feed at the beginning of the year and marketing of a large proportion of the 1953 lamb crop for slaughter.

Horse and mule numbers continue to decline at about the same rapid rate as in recent years. The proportion of total horse inventories kept for riding stock, saddle horses and cow ponies is increasing steadily. Work stock continues to give way to tractors and trucks.

Chickens on farms January 1, excluding commercial broilers, totaled 439 million, an increase of 2 percent from a year ago but 10 percent below the 1943-52 average. Pullets were 11 percent greater than on January 1, 1953. Turkey inventories on farms January 1 totaled 5.3 million head—about the same as a year ago. The number of breeder hens were the same as the year before, but the heavy breeds were down 7 percent and the light breed hens up 40 percent.
