



# Mississippi Crop Progress and Condition Report



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Cooperating with Mississippi Department of Agriculture and Commerce

Week Ending May 21, 2017

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According to the National Agricultural Statistics Service in Mississippi, there were 5.1 days suitable for fieldwork for the **week ending Sunday, May 21, 2017**. Topsoil moisture supplies were 1 percent very short, 10 percent short, 63 percent adequate, and 26 percent surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies were 1 percent very short, 13 percent short, 66 percent adequate, and 20 percent surplus. Low temperatures ranged from 59.1 degrees Fahrenheit at Booneville to 72.8 degrees Fahrenheit at Biloxi. Highs ranged from 82.4 degrees Fahrenheit at Clarksdale to 91.0 degrees Fahrenheit at Yazoo City. Most of the state received some rain, with the highest concentration in the coastal part of the state with an average of 1.50 inches.

“The harvest of hay is almost complete for now. Our livestock producers have started evaluating their pastures and hay fields so that they can make decisions on fertilization and weed control. Our row crop producers continue to plant, fertilize and apply herbicide applications between scattered showers; our vegetable crop producers are doing the same.”

“Crops are looking good, and for the most part off to a great start. There are still a few acres of cotton and soybeans to be planted, but we should get them in the ground in the next few days. Timely rains have helped activate our pre-emerge chemicals and most fields are really clean.”

“Our crop conditions for the county are improving, but with some of the heavy rain storms, some of the producers had to replant some acreage. Livestock on pastureland are improving a good bit and the conditions on pasture and hay fields are looking good. We have had some signs of some wild hog damage in some areas of row crops. This is a growing threat in some areas of the county.”

“Rain showers have brought much needed moisture to the area but has halted cotton and peanut planting over the past few days. The corn crop has really benefited from the rainfall and has really grown over the past few weeks from fertilization, heat and the rainfall.”
