According to the National Agricultural Statistics Service in Mississippi, there were 4.8 days suitable for fieldwork for the **week ending Sunday, May 20, 2018**. Topsoil moisture supplies were 0 percent very short, 13 percent short, 61 percent adequate, and 26 percent surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies were 0 percent very short, 10 percent short, 63 percent adequate, and 27 percent surplus. Low temperatures ranged from 61.2 degrees Fahrenheit at Yazoo City to 72.9 degrees Fahrenheit at Vicksburg City. Highs ranged from 85.4 degrees Fahrenheit at Independence to 96.0 degrees Fahrenheit at Vicksburg City. Most of the State received some rain, with the highest concentration in the upper delta part of the State with an average of 1.19 inches.
