## USDA to gather data about farm labor

October 8, 2024 – USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) will conduct its biannual <u>Agricultural Labor Survey</u> this month. More than 80 Nevada farmers and ranchers will be asked to participate in the survey online at <u>agcounts.usda.gov</u> or by mail. The survey is an opportunity for producers to provide accurate information about hired farm labor, including total number of hired farm workers, total hours worked, and total wages paid for the weeks of July 7-13 and October 6-12, 2024.

"We ask about two separate time periods each time we collect these data in order to publish biannual data and capture seasonal variation," said Gary Keough, Director of the NASS Pacific Regional Field Office. "This method reduces the number of times we survey farms, while ensuring useful data are available."

USDA and the U.S. Department of Labor use the survey data to estimate the demand for and availability of seasonal agricultural workers, establish minimum wage rates for agricultural workers, and administer farm labor recruitment and placement service programs.

Survey recipients who do not respond by Oct. 16 may be contacted by NASS to arrange an interview or sent a reminder email. NASS will publish the data Nov. 20 in the *Farm Labor* report available at <a href="nass.usda.gov/publications">nass.usda.gov/publications</a>.

"When hiring workers and estimating expenses, timely and accurate agricultural labor data are vital," said Keough. "By participating in NASS's Agricultural Labor Survey, farmers and ranchers help ensure accurate information for farm programs."
