Rainfall amounts none most of today but a tenth of an inch with locally heavy amounts possible late this afternoon and evening, none Saturday. Winds for spraying southwest 5 to 10 mph today, southwest 5 mph tonight, southwest around 10 mph Saturday.

Relative humidity in percent 50 to 60 today, near 100 tonight, 40 to 50 Saturday. Dew points low to mid 60s through tonight, upper 60s Saturday. Drying conditions fair today but localized poor areas later this afternoon, fair Saturday. Some dew tonight as well as wetting in early showers, moderate dew Friday night. Percent of possible sunshine 30 today, 80 Saturday.

There is a 50 percent probability of precipitation during the 12 hour period beginning at 8 am and ending at 8 pm that could adversely affect the performance of pesticides that require a rain-free period after application.

Conditions will be unfavorable for cranberry scald today and Saturday.

Hay cutting runs a risk of wetting later today and tonight and then dry conditions on Saturday but then a moderate risk of wetting in showers each of the next several days.

The latest 8 to 14 day outlook for the period July 31, 2009 to August 6, 2009 is calling for temperatures to average near normal and precipitation to average above normal.

Summer Vegetable Harvesting Continues

Days suitable for field work, for the week ending Sunday, July 26, 2009, were 6.0. Topsoil moisture was rated as 10% short, 85% adequate, and 5% surplus. Subsoil moisture was rated as 10% short, 85% adequate, and 5% surplus. There were measurable amounts of rainfall for the week in some localities. Temperatures were below normal across the Garden State. Activities during the week were cutting hay and spraying herbicides. Conditions for corn and soybeans rated fair to good. Less supplemental feeding of livestock was needed as pastures were adequate. Summer vegetable harvesting including sweet corn, snap beans, cucumbers, and cabbage progressed. Fall vegetable planting continued. Early variety peach harvesting continued with good to excellent quality.
