August 23, 2010

Peach Harvest In Full Swing

Days suitable for field work, for the week ending Sunday August 22, 2010, were 6.0. Topsoil moisture was rated as 60% short and 40% adequate. Subsoil moisture was rated as 40% short and 60% adequate. There were measurable amounts of rainfall during the week in most localities. Temperatures were above normal across the Garden State. Hot, dry conditions continued to stress field-crops. Farmers irrigated as needed. Crop conditions rated poor to fair for corn and soybeans. Second and third-cuttings of hay continued. Vegetable growers continued harvesting summer vegetables. Fall vegetables planted included cabbage, lettuce, and snap beans. Peaches reached mid-harvest while early-season grape picking began.

Jersey Fresh Availability & Forecast Report

July extended our four month run of record warmth into a fifth month as July '10 ranks as the second warmest on record. Early season warmth caused us to have a historically early start to our summer season produce and crops are still at least a week to ten days earlier than normal. This week's much cooler temperatures will provide relief to our stressed farmers and their stressed produce. Although there's been a little rainfall lately to provide some relief to our heat stressed crops, our farmers have had to irrigate constantly to mitigate these affects. This effort comes at a physical and financial expense though. Heat stress has been causing decreased production levels and smaller sizes for most produce items and this is a concern. There's been a shortage of peppers, and especially tomatoes, for the last several weeks due to a number of reasons. Hot and stressful July growing conditions caused pollination issues, blossom burn off, and problems with fruit growth. Hard rains several weeks ago also caused ripe fruit to take on too much water and resulted in quality issues. Sequential plantings of produce items all ripened at the same time too due to the constant hot weather, leaving us a supply gap for a couple of weeks. Farmers are between plantings right now and it will be a week or two before some items are in normal late season supply.

We will have high humidity all week. Perhaps our 70-80% probability of showers tonight and tomorrow night will help to cool things down and provide much needed relief to our parched produce. We'll see mid-70's daytime temperatures building to mid-80's by the weekend. There will be cool overnight temperatures as low 60's will predominate a
