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### **New Jersey Weather and Crop Progress Bulletin**

October 22, 2013

#### **Dry Week; Cranberry Harvest Well Underway**

Statewide, six days were suitable for field work. Topsoil moisture was 20% short, 77% adequate, and 3% surplus. Subsoil moisture was 1% very short, 9% short, 80% adequate, and 10% surplus. Pasture and range condition was 1% very poor, 4% poor, 18% fair, 42% good, and 35% excellent.

Average temperatures were three degrees lower overall than the previous week. High temperatures ranged from 72 degrees in Freehold, Toms River, and Trenton to 76 degrees in New Brunswick. Low temperatures ranged from 33 degrees in Belvidere to 45 degrees in South Harrison. Rainfall was much lower across the state than the previous week, ranging from none in Freehold, Cape May, and South Harrison to 0.15 inch in Trenton.

Cranberry harvest is about 65% complete. Sweet corn and grape harvesting are nearing completion. Pumpkin and apple harvesting are mostly done. Field corn harvesting for grain is well underway. Soybean harvesting is in progress. In Monmouth County, grapes have higher sugar content due to mid-summer drought, and field corn and soybean yields are expected to be low

in many areas of the county. In Warren County, fall vegetable plantings are nearly complete and wheat and rye planting are underway. In Mercer County, most fall cover crops in vegetable fields are in the ground and are up.

Cranberries are in good condition. Grapes are in good to excellent condition. Sweet corn and pumpkins are in mostly good condition. Apples are in fair to excellent condition.

# Climate Summary for the Week Ending 10/21/13 at 8 AM (Issued by Rutgers University)

Temperatures averaged 55 degrees north, 57 degrees central, and 58 degrees south. Extremes were 76 degrees at New Brunswick on the 18th and 33 degrees at Belvidere on the 21st. Weekly rainfall averaged 0.04 inches north, 0.06 inches central, and 0.06 inches south. The heaviest 24-hour total reported was 0.12 inches at Trenton on the 19th to 20th.
