Excellent Week for Field Work: New Jersey had an average of 5.5 days suitable for field work. Lots of rain and high temperature in most of the counties. There were little insect problem in sweet corn. There was major disease called Phytophthora in peppers. Planting continues in snap beans, basil, cilantro, parsley, collards, sweet corn, cucumbers, pumpkins and summer squash. Following crops are being harvested: arugula, snap beans, beets basil, blueberries, cilantro, cabbage, cantaloupe, collards, sweet corn, cucumbers, summer dandelion, dill, eggplant, kale, leeks, parsley, peppers, summer squash, butternut squash, Swiss chard, green onions and tomatoes.

Cumberland County, Dr. Wesley Kline

Extra rain continues to be an issue. The major disease issue is Phytophthora in peppers. Harvesting continues in arugula, snap beans, beets basil, blueberries, cilantro, cabbage, cantaloupe, collards, sweet corn, cucumbers, summer dandelion, dill, eggplant, kale, leeks, parsley, peppers, summer squash, butternut squash, Swiss chard, green onions and tomatoes. Transplanting has started in escarole and endive and continue in leeks. Seeding continues in snap beans, basil, cilantro, parsley, collards, sweet corn, cucumbers, pumpkins and summer squash.

Mercer County, Meredith Melendez

Crop harvests continue with tomatoes now available in Mercer County.

Monmouth County, Bill Sciarappa

Regular rains and high temperatures are getting the summer season back on track. Sweet corn in late but relatively little insect problems. Spray drift injury in pumpkins/tomato/etc - high winds for other crop sprays and lawn applications.

Finishing wheat harvest, baling straw, planting double crop beans, more significant rains fell this week limiting access to fields and work days, livestock condition good, milk production average for time of year
