Excellent Week for Field Work: New Jersey had an average of 6.5 days suitable for field work. Temperatures were slightly lower than normal. Stations averaged roughly half an inch of rain for the week. In Mercer County, agri tourism still busy. October agritourism hurt by rainy weekend forecasts. Rain did not always happen, but the forecast kept people away. Good corn yields. Soybean yields are spotty. In Burlington County agri tourism still busy. Cabbage harvested as cold weather hit. In Cumberland County, frost on night of October 25. Two more weeks of farmers markets with good attendance. Summer crops about done. Fall crop harvest continues. Irrigated corn did well. In Hunterdon County first frost occurred the night of October 25. Growers were pulling remaining vegetables. Agri tourism winding down. Annual bison roundup pending. In Monmouth County still moving bees home. Need to feed some that are skinny. In Salem County peaches loosing leaves. Apple harvest done. Vegetables did well. In Warren County first frost occurred the night of October 25. Corn and beans being harvested. Light test weight. Following crops being planted: wheat and cover crops. Following crops being harvested: field corn, soybeans, arugula, beets, bok choi, cilantro, cabbage, collards, summer dandelion, dill, eggplant, escarole, endive, kohl rabi, kale, leeks, pumpkins, lettuce, mint, parsley, peppers, winter squash, Swiss chard, scallions, spinach, turnips, sweet potatoes and fennel.

Following crops being harvested: field corn, soybeans, arugula, beets, bok choi, cilantro, cabbage, collards, summer dandelion, dill, eggplant, escarole, endive, kohl rabi, kale, leeks, pumpkins, lettuce, mint, parsley, peppers, winter squash, Swiss chard, scallions, spinach, turnips, sweet potatoes and fennel. Following crops being planted: wheat and cover crops. There was a killing frost in most parts for the county this past week.

Gloucester County, Michele Infante-Casella

Sweet Potatoes still being harvested, but 80% of crop in storage, broccoli, cauliflower, cabbage, greens, beets, lettuce, leeks, parsley, cilantro, fennel, turnips and other cold tolerant crops still being harvested

Monmouth County, Bill Sciarappa

Recent rains have improved soil moisture and groundwater and farm ponds but slowed corn-soy-alfalfa harvest and hinders Halloween events on the farm.

Warren County, Debra Crisman

Extreme dry conditions continue. Farmers are reporting heavy bear damage in corn, what can be done to help? No reprieve from scheduled bear hunt or the managed wildlife deprivation permits. Dairy producers discouraged over continued low milk prices.
