days suitable for field work. New Jersey had a second week of scattered showers and cool temperatures across the state, unusual for August when dry hot temperatures are expected. High temperatures hovered at around only 90 degrees while lows were mostly in the 50's. There is enough moisture in the ground from the rainfall in previous and current weeks to have topsoil and subsoil moisture at adequate levels for nearly all reporting

The following crops are still being planted: Snap beans, basil, arugula, cilantro, collards, cabbage, sweet corn, cucumbers, summer dandelion, dill, leeks, lettuce, parsley, radishes, summer squash, Swiss chard, scallions and spinach.

While crops have mainly looked good so far this summer, with few insect or disease problems, there are concerns about a higher occurrence of disease in vegetables. One crop benefitting from the cooler temperatures are peaches, as these temperatures reduce split pit in the crop. Mid-season yellow flesh peach varieties are being harvested at peak or are approaching last pick. Mid-Late season yellow flesh varieties are beginning to be picked. White Flesh peach variety is approaching final pick while Sugar Giant harvest is peaking. Wine grape varieties are approaching veraison, marked by 50% berries of cluster changing color. Dry weather post-veraison does help growers, however currently it's not too wet and the moderate warm temperatures are welcomed by wine grape growers.

Crops have looked good all summer with few insect or disease problems.

Gloucester County, Dr. Hemant Gohil

Enough moisture in the ground by rain from previous and current week. Also, not so hot temperatures reduces split pit in peaches. Mid-season yellow flesh peach varieties Bounty, July Prince, PF 17, PF 23, PF 25, PF 19-007, and PF 28 are harvested at peak or approaching last pick. Mid-Late season yellow flesh varieties Messina and Gloria are beginning to be picked. White Flesh peach

variety Klondike approaching final pick while Sugar Giant harvest is peaking. Nectarine varieties Fantasia, Red Gold, Flavortop and Sun Glow are being picked. Wine grape varieties approaching veraison, marked by 50% berries of cluster changing color and or getting softened. Dry weather post-veraison helps growers, however it's not too wet and moderate warm temperatures are welcomed by wine grape growers.

Mercer County, Meredith Melendez

Harvesting now: beans, beets, broccoli, cabbage, cantaloupe, carrots, cauliflower, chard, cucumbers, eggplant, fennel, cut flowers, eggplant, garlic, kale, head lettuce, leaf lettuce, herbs, nectarines okra, onions, sweet peppers, hot peppers, peaches potatoes, scallions, shell peas, spinach, sugar snap peas, summer squash, sweet corn, tomatoes, watermelon.
