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Good Week for Field Work: New Jersey had an average of 5.5 days suitable for field work. Temperatures across New Jersey were again cooler than normal. Precipitation varied from 0.63 inches in Mt. Holly to 4.19 in Cape May. High temperatures only reached the mid-80's across much of the state, while lows were again mostly in the 50's. The ground is saturated in many areas and the topsoil and subsoil moisture surplus continues to increase throughout most of the state. Some local storms were severe with hail damage reported.

Heavy rains in parts of the state slowed planting, but the following crops are still being planted: Snap beans, arugula, cilantro, cabbage, sweet corn, cucumbers, escarole, endive, kale, leeks, lettuce, parsley, radish, scallions and spinach.

The following crops are being harvested: arugula, snap beans, beets, basil, cilantro, cabbage, cantaloupe, carrots, collards, sweet corn, cucumbers, summer dandelion, dill, eggplant, kale, leeks, parsley, peppers of all kinds, summer and winter squash, Swiss chard, scallions, tomatoes, watermelon, peaches, hay, white potatoes and nectarines. Blueberry harvest is nearly completed across the state, including late season varieties.

The tomato crop is reported as behind normal production for this time of the year and tomato size is medium with few large ones. There are delays in ripening, and higher temperatures would be very beneficial to the crop. There are also reports of some early blight. Eggplants are getting verticillium wilt and squash bugs are on cucurbits. Pyrethroids are working on worms as temperatures are moderate and not too high for efficacy. There were reports of disease in squash and large moth flights. Second cut grasses, while looking good, will need some clear weather to harvest. On a good note, the cool night temperatures are expected to improve development of cool season crops and fall seeded crops are emerging quickly with warm soils and adequate rains.

Fall seeded crops are emerging quickly with warm soils and adequate rains. Eggplant, summer squash, cucumber/pickle harvests continue with excellent quality. Large variety of fresh herbs available.

Burlington County, Raymond J. Samulis, AG

Blueberry harvest completed including late season varieties. Summer squash, sweet corn, peppers of all kinds, carrots, beets, watermelons, cantaloupes, peaches all continue to be harvested. Tomato crop behind normal production for this time of the year. White potato harvest in full swing. Some hail damage reported from severe local storms.

Cumberland County, Dr. Wesley Kline

The following crops are being harvested: arugula, snap beans, beets basil, cilantro, cabbage, cantaloupe, collards, sweet corn, cucumbers, summer dandelion, dill, eggplant, kale, leeks, parsley, peppers, summer squash, winter squash, Swiss chard, scallions,

tomatoes, watermelon, peaches, hay, white potatoes and nectarines. The following crops are being planted: Heavy rains in parts of the county slowed planting. Cool night temperatures will improve development of cool season crops.

Monmouth County, Bill Sciarappa

Tomato size is medium - not much large ones. Some early Blight. Eggplants are getting verticillium wilt Squash bugs on cucurbits. Pyrethroids are working on worms as temperatures are moderate and not too high for efficacy, and large moth flights.
