# New Jersey

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Good Week for Field Work: New Jersey had an average of 5.5 days suitable for field work. There was rain reported across the entire state. Temperatures were cooler than normal, only reaching the low 80's in most areas of New Jersey. Lows again were predominately in the 40's and low 50's. These cool evenings and nights are ideal for cool season crops such as cabbage, cauliflower, kale, broccoli, etc.

Excellent quality peaches continue to be harvested throughout New Jersey. The tomato harvest continues with some reports of delayed ripening. Per reporters, the white potato crop has excellent quality and yields this season. The harvest is ending soon for peaches with overall good yields and high pack outs reported so far. The following crops are also being harvested: Early varieties of wine grapes, apples, arugula, snap beans, beets, basil, cilantro, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, chives, collards, sweet corn, cucumbers, summer dandelion, eggplant, ground cherries, kale, leeks, head and leaf lettuce, melons, onions, pears, pumpkins, parsley, okra, sweet and hot peppers, radishes, summer and winter squash, Swiss chard, scallions, spinach, tomatoes, turnips, and sweet potatoes.

The following crops are being planted: Cilantro, kale, leeks, parsley, scallions, spinach, winter wheat and cover crops.

There are reports that crops in some areas of New Jersey are suffering from more diseases due to the rainfall, lower temperatures and cloudy conditions. On a good note, the steady rains are also reported to be helping increase growth in crops suffering from delayed growth and have assured that there is no need for irrigation for fruit. There is enough moisture throughout the ripening season for high quality fruit. The periodic rains with higher day-to-night temperature differences are also helping wine grapes to accumulate flavor and color. Cranberries appear to be growing well with harvest starting in the next few weeks on larger farms and harvest beginning in October for smaller acreage farms.

#### Burlington County, Raymond J. Samulis, AG

Excellent quality peaches continue to be harvested. Tomato harvest continues with some reports of delayed ripening. Cranberries appear to be growing well with harvest starting in the next few weeks on larger farms and harvest beginning in October for smaller acreage farms. Beets, carrots, squash (both summer and winter) being harvested. Reports of excellent quality and yields for the white potato crop.

#### Cumberland County, Dr. Wesley L. Kline

Cool evenings and nights are idea for cool season crops such as cabbage, cauliflower, kale, broccoli, etc. The following crops are being harvested: Arugula, snap beans, beets, basil, cilantro, cabbage, collards, sweet corn, cucumbers, summer dandelion, eggplant, kale, leeks, pumpkins, parsley, okra, peppers, radishes, summer squash and winter squash, Swiss chard, scallions, spinach, tomatoes, turnips, sweet potatoes and white potatoes. The following crops are being planted: cilantro, kale, leeks, parsley, scallions, spinach, wheat and cover crops.

#### Gloucester County, Dr. Hemant Gohil

Periodic precipitation assured no need for irrigation, enough moisture throughout the ripening season and high quality fruits. The harvest season ending with peach varieties Snow Giant<sup>TM</sup>, Encore<sup>TM</sup>, 007<sup>TM</sup> and PF -36<sup>TM</sup> being picked. Overall good yields and high pack outs. Apple varieties being harvested are, Fuji<sup>TM</sup> and Golden Delicious<sup>TM</sup>. Early varieties of Wine grape such as Marquee<sup>TM</sup> and Arandell being harvested. Again periodic rains with higher day-night temperature difference helping accumulate flavor and color.

#### Mercer County, Meredith Melendez

Harvesting now: apples, beets, baby greens mix, broccoli, carrots, cauliflower, chives, cucumber, eggplant, herbs, green beans, ground cherries, kale, lettuce (head and leaf), melons, okra, onions, pears, peppers (sweet and hot), radish, sweet corn, sugar snap peas, spinach, summer squash, sugar snap peas, tomatoes, watermelon.

#### Monmouth County, Bill Sciarappa

Steady hard rains good for catching up delayed crop growth but lower temperatures and cloudy skies. More diseases.
