Excellent Week for Field Work: New Jersey had an average of 6 days suitable for field work. Temperatures have been above normal, with highs in the 80's across the state. Rainfall was again below normal for the week. Per the New Jersey Farm Bureau Newsletter, it has been more than two weeks without measurable rainfall in New Jersey but the impact they report to be benign, since most crops are ready for harvest and nice weekend weather creates good business conditions for retail farm markets and upick apples and pumpkins.

The summer crop harvest is still progressing due to the mild, warmer than average weather across the state, with late harvests of eggplant, peppers, tomatoes and some summer squash. The following crops are also still being harvested: Soybeans, field corn, hay, apples, grapes, arugula, snap beans, beets, broccoli, cauliflower, basil, cilantro, cabbage, collards, sweet corn, dill, escarole, endive, kale, leeks, pumpkins, lettuce, parsley, scallions, winter squash, Swiss chard, spinach, summer dandelion, radishes and sweet potatoes. A few crops are still being planted, mainly cover crops, spinach, and wheat.



Following crops being planted: cover crop, spinach and wheat.

BASIL	Likes warmth so cool nights are slowing production. Harvesting good quality product in light to decreasing volume.			
BEETS	Harvesting a good volume of very good quality products.			
CABBAGE	Harvesting a good volume of good quality green, savoy, & red. Available through Thanksgiving.			
CILANTRO	Harvesting good quality product in fair volume as the weather cools.			
COLLARDS	Harvesting a good volume of very good quality products. Available through Thanksgiving.			
CRANBERRIES	Large growers have been harvesting. Smaller growers harvesting now after waiting to develop more maturity and sugar levels. Like apples, cool nights would help to develop color.			
CUCUMBERS	Very good quality pickles and cukes harvesting in light to decreasing volume.			
DANDELIONS	Good quality and quantity of product is available.			
EGGPLANT	Harvesting a fair to light & decreasing volume of very good quality field grown product.			
DILL	Harvesting good quality in fair to increasing volume as the weather cools.			
ESCAROLE & ENDIVE	Harvesting a fair to good volume with the cooler Fall weather returning.			
KALE	Very good quality product harvesting in good volume. Available through Thanksgiving.			
LEEKS	A fair volume of good quality product is available.			
LETTUCES	Harvesting a light to fair volume of good quality products, later than normal, because the mid-Summer heat discouraged early planting & caused some germination issues. A smaller crop than normal.			
MINT	Harvesting very good quality in light to decreasing volume.			
PARSLEY	Harvesting good quality curly and plain product in fair volume.			
PEPPERS	Harvesting a fair to light &o decreasing volume of very good quality product.			
PUMPKINS	Harvesting good quality in fair to good, but slightly less than normal, volume as there was a lighter fruit set due to mid-Summer heat & less than ideal bee pollination. Regular rains have kept growth and sizing of fruit steady. There should be some large pumpkins this year.			
RADISHES	Harvesting good quality product in fair to good volume as the weather cools.			
SPINACH	Harvesting a light to increasing volume of good quality product as the weather cools. Should be a bit more volume over the next couple of weeks.			
SQUASH	Harvesting a light to decreasing volume of very good quality Summer squashes. Hard squashes like butternut and acorn, are in fair to decreasing volume			
SWEET CORN	A light to decreasing volume of mostly good quality product. Quality varies a bit now as seasonal insect pressures mount.			
SWEET POTATOES	Harvesting a good volume of very good quality product.			
SWISS CHARD	Harvesting good quality products in good volume.			
TOMATOES	A fair to light & decreasing volume of good quality product available. It's been a later and shorter season than normal.			
TURNIPS	Harvesting good quality product in fair to increasing volume as the weather cools.			
WHITE POTATOES	Harvesting a good volume of mainly round white & red varieties. Also harvesting yellow fleshed varieties and Russets in fair to good volume. Source your N.J. potatoes in their distinctive "Jersey Fresh" bags.
