# Crop Progress & Condition

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Week ending November 12, 2017

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Excellent Week for Field Work: New Jersey had an average of 6 days suitable for field work. The state finally experienced its first hard freeze of the season with reported low temperatures dropping down into the 20's and slightly below across the state, though daytime highs still remained in the 60's and low 70's.

Rains and winds delayed the final agronomic harvest in some areas of New Jersey. Those rains also helped to keep the topsoil and subsoil moistures at adequate and surplus levels throughout New Jersey, with no shortages.

Field crop harvesting is mostly complete. Outdoor harvest of summer crops such as tomatoes, eggplant, peppers, etc. is finished for the year, but greenhouse and high tunnel production continues, especially for tomatoes. The following crops were harvested this past week: beets, cilantro, cabbage, collards, summer dandelion, kale, leeks, parsley, Swiss chard, scallions, spinach and fennel, soybeans, and field corn. Balled and burlapped nursery stock is also still being dug and shipped.

Fall farm work continues. Most fall applications of soil amendments have been completed.

The following crops are still being planted: cover crops and wheat. Winter wheat is emerging well. Now that Halloween is over, agribusinesses are preparing for

December holiday events and markets.

## JERSEY FRESH AVAILABILITY FOR NOVEMBER 13, 2017

APPLES	Many varieties harvested & in storage. Storage apples & cider available through Christmas.
Arugula	Frost has hurt. Finishing.
Baby Spinach & Arugula	Frost has hurt. Finishing.
BASIL	Frost has hurt. Finishing.
Beets	Harvesting a light to decreasing volume of good quality products. Can tolerate a little bit of frost though tops were probably hurt first by frost this weekend. May be available thru Thanksgiving.
Cabbage	Harvesting a good volume of good quality green, savoy, & red. Can tolerate a little frost. Available through Thanksgiving.
CILANTRO	Frost has hurt. Finishing.
Collards	Harvesting a good volume of very good quality products. Can tolerate a bit of frost. Available through Thanksgiving.
CRANBERRIES	Many growers delayed harvesting to develop more maturity and sugar levels. Like apples, cool nights are helping to develop color.
CUCUMBERS	Frost has hurt. Finishing.
Dandelions	Good quality and fair quantity of product is available.
EGGPLANT	Frost has hurt. Finishing.
Dill	Frost has hurt. Finishing.
Escarole & Endive	Harvesting very good quality in fair to light & decreasing volume. Can tolerate a little frost.
KALE	Very good quality product harvesting in good volume. Can tolerate a little frost. Available through Thanksgiving.
Leeks	A fair volume of good quality product is available. Can tolerate a bit of frost.
LETTUCES	Harvesting a very light volume of good quality products that were kept under cover. The heartier Romaine will survive a little longer than leaf lettuces. Frost has hurt. Finishing.
MINT	Frost has hurt. Finishing.
PARSLEY	Likes cooler weather and can tolerate a bit of frost. Harvesting good quality curly and plain product in fair to light & decreasing volume.
PEPPERS	Frost has hurt. Finishing.
PUMPKINS	Harvested good quality & in storage. Regular rains kept growth and sizing of fruit steady. There are some large pumpkins this year.
RADISHES	Harvesting good quality product in fair to decreasing volume.
Spinach	Harvesting a light to decreasing volume of good quality product. Can tolerate a little frost.
SQUASH	Hard squashes like butternut and acorn are harvested, cured, & in storage in fair to light & decreasing volume. Available through Thanksgiving.
Sweet Corn	Frost has hurt. Finishing.
SWEET POTATOES	A fair to light & decreasing volume of very good quality product is harvested, cured, & in storage.
SWISS CHARD	Harvesting good quality products in light to decreasing volume. Can tolerate a little bit of frost. May be available thru Thanksgiving.
TOMATOES	Frost has hurt. Finishing.
Turnips	Harvesting good quality product in fair to light & decreasing volume. Likes cooler weather.
White Potatoes	Mainly round white varieties, w/ some redskin, yellow fleshed & Russet varieties harvested, in storage, & available. Source your N.J. potatoes in their distinctive "Jersey Fresh" bags.
