According to the National Agricultural Statistics Service in New Jersey, there were 7 days suitable for fieldwork for the **week ending Sunday, September 22, 2019**. Topsoil moisture supplies were 34 percent very short, 11 percent short, 55 percent adequate, and 0 percent surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies were 15 percent very short, 20 percent short, 65 percent adequate, and 0 percent surplus. Pasture and range conditions ranged from 13 percent very poor, 17 percent poor, 14 percent fair, 56 percent good, and 0 percent excellent.

Gloucester, Dr. Hemant Gohil – Scant moisture in the soil, plenty of sunshine and a greater day-night temperature difference, means excellent weather for ripening wine grape – Great vintage 2019 is assured for the Gloucester county and the rest of wine country. Peach harvest is over with much relief during the final months of picking and Apple harvest is going on; again this weather is helping apple producers as well.

**Monmouth County, Bill Sciarappa -** Pumpkin crop weedy with some diseases. Peaches are ok. Sweet/soft rots. Apples firm/reddening up. Fields dried out ready for agronomic harvest.

**New Jersey State Statistician, Bruce Eklund -** Cumberland County haying is active. Nurseries are irrigating so rain would be welcome in that regard.
