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According to the National Agricultural Statistics Service in New Jersey, there were 5.5 days suitable for fieldwork for the **week ending Sunday, November 10, 2019**. Topsoil moisture supplies were 0 percent very short, 11 percent short, 87 percent adequate, and 2 percent surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies were 0 percent very short, 9 percent short, 89 percent adequate, and 2 percent surplus. Pasture and range conditions ranged from 0 percent very poor, 0 percent poor, 5 percent fair, 93 percent good, and 2 percent excellent.

APPLES	Many varieties are harvested & in storage, & like cider, available through Christmas.
ARUGULA	Harvesting very good quality in light to decreasing volume. The expected overnight frost most of the week will hurt.
BABY SPINACH & ARUGULA	Harvesting a light to decreasing volume of excellent quality products. The expected overnight frost most of the week will hurt.
BEETS	Harvesting a light to decreasing volume of very good quality product. Can tolerate a bit of frost though the expected overnight frost most of the week will hurt.
CABBAGE	Harvesting a fair volume of very good quality green, savoy, & red. Can tolerate a little frost.
CILANTRO	Harvesting very good quality in fair to decreasing volume. The expected overnight frost most of the week will hurt.
COLLARDS	Harvesting a fair volume of very good quality product. Available through Thanksgiving.
DANDELIONS	Harvest of very good quality Spring planted available in fair to decreasing volume.
DILL	Harvesting very good quality in light to decreasing volume. The expected overnight frost most of the week will hurt.
ESCAROLE & ENDIVE	Harvesting a fair to decreasing volume of very good quality products. Can tolerate a little frost.
KALE	Harvesting very good quality in fair volume. Can tolerate a little frost. Available through Thanksgiving.
LEEKS	A fair volume of good quality product available. Can tolerate a bit of frost.
LETTUCES	Harvesting very good quality lettuces in fair to decreasing volume. The heartier Romaine will survive a little longer than other lettuces. The expected overnight frost most of the week will hurt.
MINT	Harvesting very good quality in light to decreasing volume. The expected overnight frost most of the week will hurt.
PARSLEY	Excellent quality products harvesting in fair volume.
RADISHES	Harvesting very good quality in light to decreasing volume.
SPINACH	Harvesting very good quality in fair volume. Can tolerate a little frost.
SQUASH	Hard squashes like butternut & acorn in fair to decreasing volume, in storage, & available through Thanksgiving.
SWEET POTATOES	Very good quality potatoes are harvested, in storage, & in good volume.
SWISS CHARD	Harvesting a fair to decreasing volume of very good quality product. Can tolerate a bit of frost though the expected overnight frost most of the week will hurt.
TURNIPS	Harvesting a fair volume of very good quality product. Likes cooler weather.
WHITE POTATOES	Excellent quality round white, red, & yellow fleshed varieties, & Russets harvested, in storage, & in good volume. Source your N.J. potatoes in their distinctive “Jersey Fresh” bags.
