As I travel across the state, I continually marvel at the economic development activities underway due to our ever-increasing agricultural productivity. New grain bins, farrowing barns, dairies, and other facilities demonstrate the remarkable progress of modern agriculture.

Farms in South Dakota are changing, and innovation is essential to continue our thriving agriculture community. In the last decade, the average farm size has increased from 1,377 acres to almost 1,400. Yields for our corn, hay, soybeans, and wheat have increased as well.
