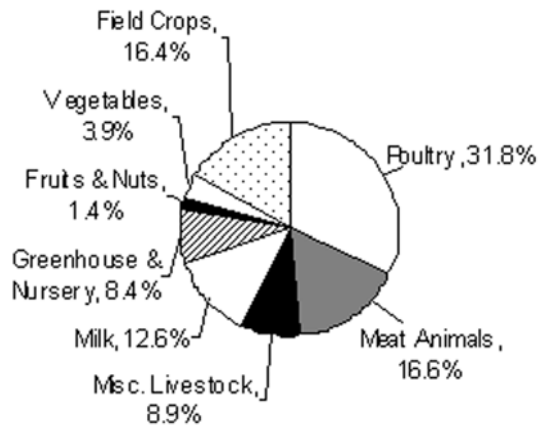

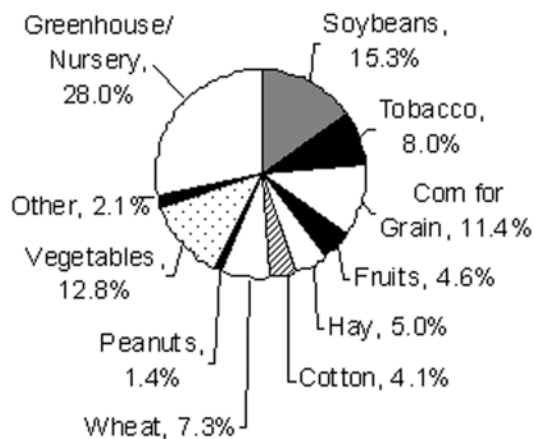

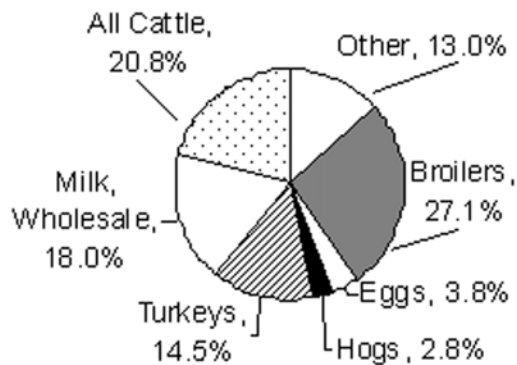

Weather & Crop Conditions

January had warmer and dryer than normal conditions. Soil moisture was adequate throughout the month. The mild temperatures early in the month helped late planted small grains but also encouraged weed growth and aphids. Some livestock were grazing pastures, but most farmers were feeding hay. Other farm activities this month included maple syrup harvest preparation, attending meetings, ordering seed and fertilizer, and fixing fences and roads.

February experienced unseasonably cold temperatures, with little precipitation. Most areas experienced dry conditions in spite of the occasional snow and rainfall. Small grains were reported to be in very good condition. Some yellowing of wheat and barley was observed. Hay supplies were beginning to run short for many livestock producers who had to start feeding their animals earlier than usual in the fall. Lambing and calving started with larger than normal losses due to the weather.

March experienced drier than normal conditions with average temperatures. Soil moisture was adequate throughout the month. Small grain crops and pastures looked good. Grain producers scouted for aphids and cereal leaf beetles and prepared to side dress wheat and barley. Tobacco transplants in greenhouses progressed well. Maple syrup producers indicated that their season was over for the year with less than average production. Other farm activities this month included fertilizer applications, cattle marketing, repairing equipment, attending meetings and preparing for spring plantings.

April had portions of Virginia receiving heavy rainfall early in the month. In some parts of the state, soil moisture was relatively short. Farmers were spraying for alfalfa weevils and scouting wheat and barley for pests. In some counties, farmers had begun to plant corn. Tobacco farmers started disking and bedding rows in the fields. Vegetable growers were preparing for planting. The Commonwealth experienced warmer temperatures with scattered showers at the end of the month. Producers were finishing up planting corn and started planting cotton and soybeans. Vegetable planting was progressing well. Flue cured tobacco transplanting was on schedule.

May showers were welcomed in the Commonwealth the first part of the month. Temperatures were above normal with highs averaging around 88 degrees with an average of 0.84 inches of rainfall. Topsoil moisture was adequate at the beginning of the month but became short towards the end, due to the dry conditions. Although many small grain fields looked good, rain was needed to help fill the heads. Corn stands looked good but producers noted animal damage in some fields. Most soybeans were coming up nicely; several producers were finishing up full season bean planting. Vegetable farmers were transplanting their crops into beds. Hay harvest was in full swing.

June saw dry weather conditions continue to take a toll on all crops and forage throughout most of the Commonwealth. Soybean planting was delayed due to the dry conditions and some tobacco farmers were awaiting rainfall to continue transplanting. Producers were harvesting wheat but were holding off on planting double cropped soybeans until soil moisture conditions improved. Wheat yields were reported as good. Hay making continued with yields ranging from average to above average. Calves were being weaned early and shipped to market to conserve feed and pasture.

-Weather & Crop Conditions, continued-

July had scattered showers across the state which provided temporary relief to some fields, while other fields continued to endure hot and dry conditions. Thunderstorms and showers delayed hay baling in some areas. Producers were nearly finished with small grain harvests and were baling wheat straw. Soybean planting continued in most regions despite weather conditions. Cattle producers started feeding hay due to pasture conditions. Early transplanted tobacco topping continued as late transplanted tobacco was beginning to show appreciable growth. Vegetable producers were irrigating heavily and harvesting summer squash, tomatoes, peppers, and cantaloupes.

August was a month of spotty storms which brought much needed precipitation to some areas. Pastures and hayfield conditions were starting to improve due to rains, but soil conditions were beginning to become dry again. Corn continued to twist and show stress. Livestock producers were beginning to market yearling cattle. Early soybeans were continuing to grow despite the dry conditions. Double cropped soybeans were appearing to have stunted growth due to the extreme heat and lack of moisture. Potato yields were reported as good. The tomato harvest was winding down as the tobacco harvest began.

September saw dry conditions continue, with generally short topsoil moisture. Pastures and hayfields remained in poor condition. Livestock herds continued to be culled in hopes of relieving feed stress issues. The corn harvest advanced with higher than expected yields in some areas. Late soybeans needed precipitation to finish pod development while some early soybeans were harvested due to pods beginning to fall. Summer tomato harvest was over and the fall harvest started.

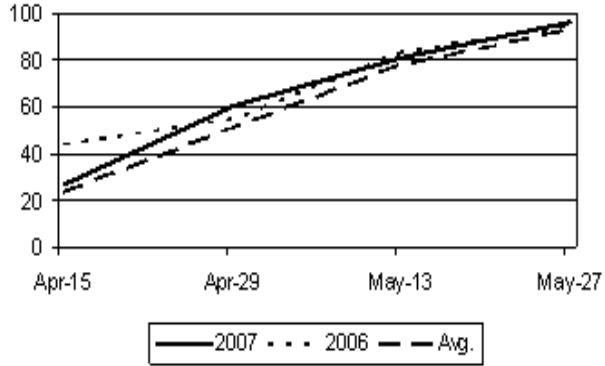
October had the majority of the Commonwealth receiving much needed precipitation this month. Topsoil moisture was generally adequate. Livestock producers hoped that the rainfall would improve pasture conditions despite expected frosts. Most producers were feeding hay despite high hay demand. Small grain plantings had slowed, with attention beginning to turn to harvesting double-crop soybeans. The cotton harvest continued.

November saw pastures attempting to recover due to the moisture, but killing frosts slowed growth considerably. Livestock producers were still culling herds and locating supplemental feed supplies. Soybean harvest continued, with yields being reported as average. With the increase in soil moisture, producers moved farther along with small grains planting.

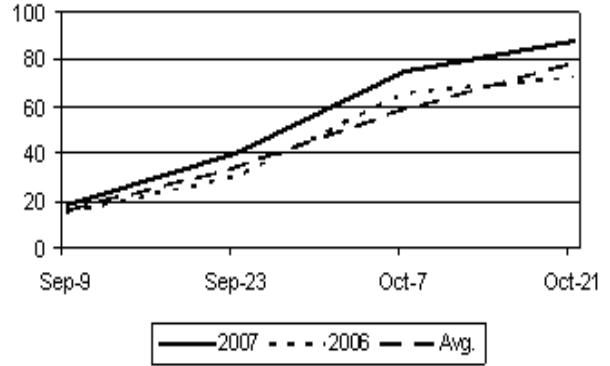
December experienced typical autumn weather. Pastures and hayfields showed little regrowth in most areas. Livestock were being culled heavily at most stockyards. The soybean harvest was very close to completion. Small grain planting also continued while some producers began top-dressing winter wheat. Other activities included drying grain, cleaning up harvesting and planting equipment, and beginning to attend pesticide recertification classes.

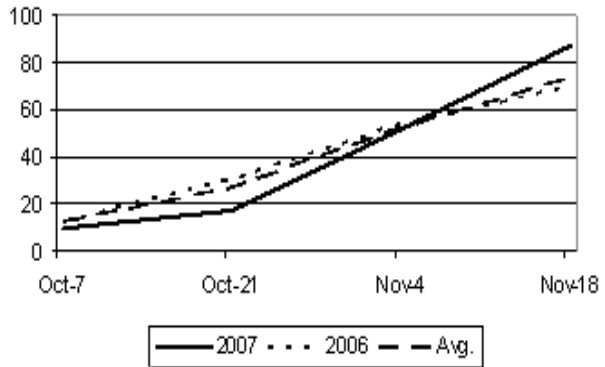
Corn Acreage Planted



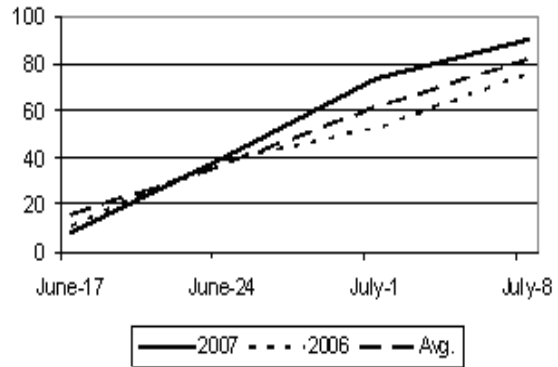
Corn for Grain Harvested



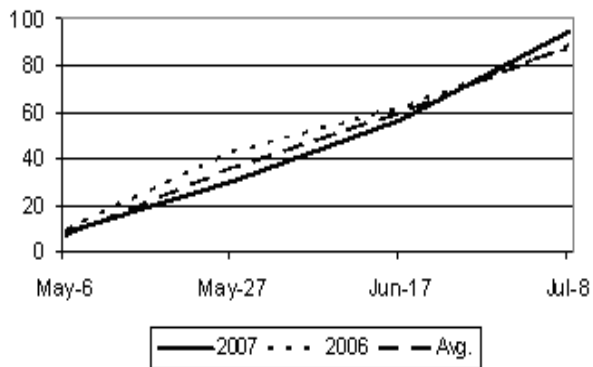
Wheat Acreage Seeded



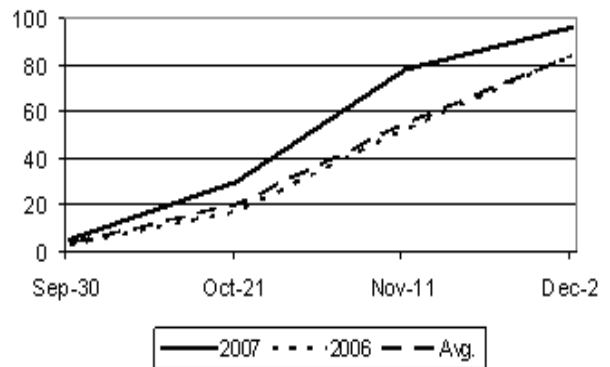
Wheat Acreage Harvested



Soybean Acreage Planted

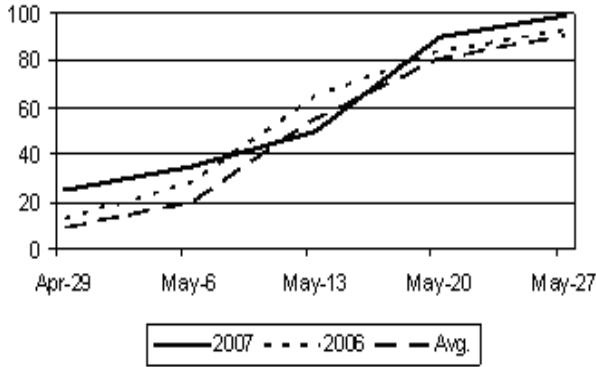


Soybean Acreage Harvested

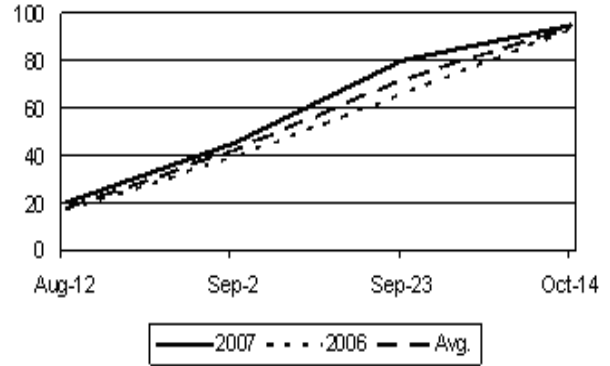

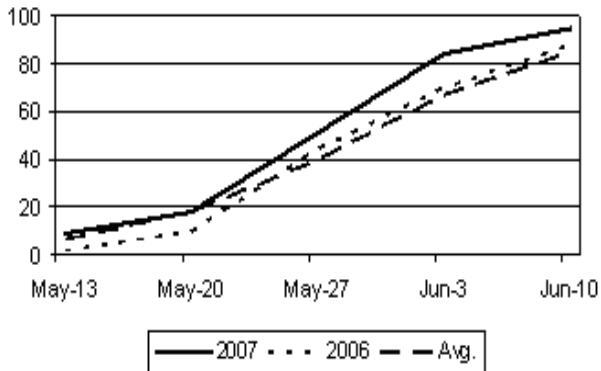
Flue Tobacco Acreage Planted



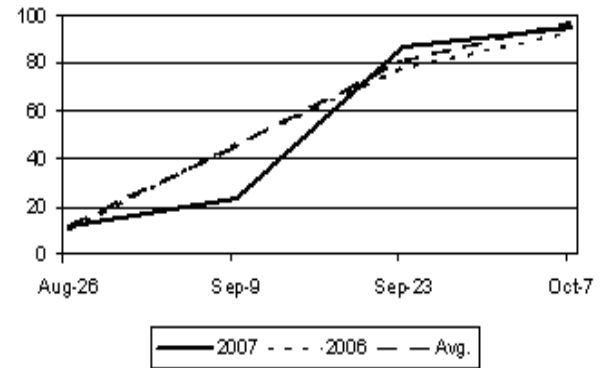
Flue Tobacco Acreage Harvested



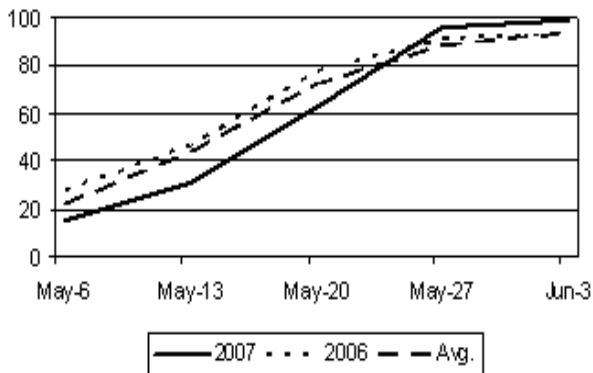
Burley Tobacco Acreage Planted



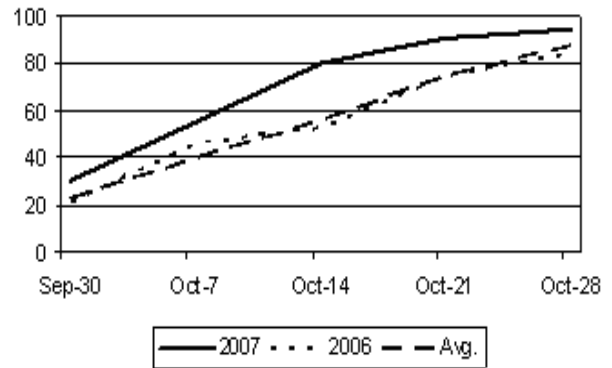
Burley Tobacco Acreage Harvested

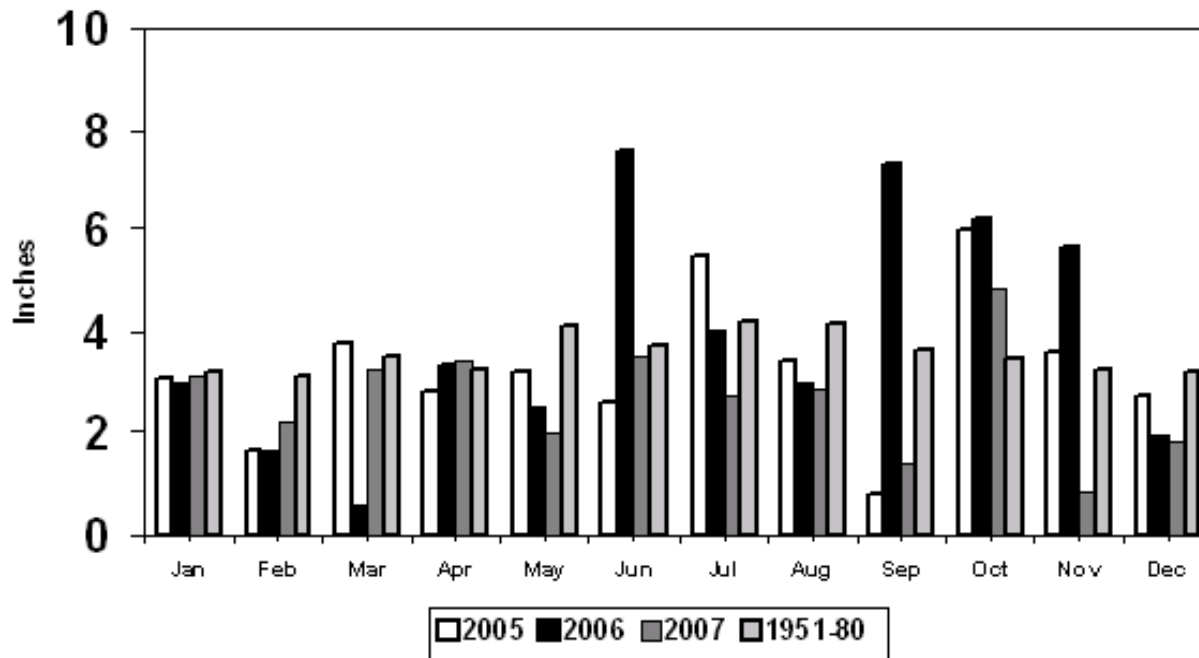

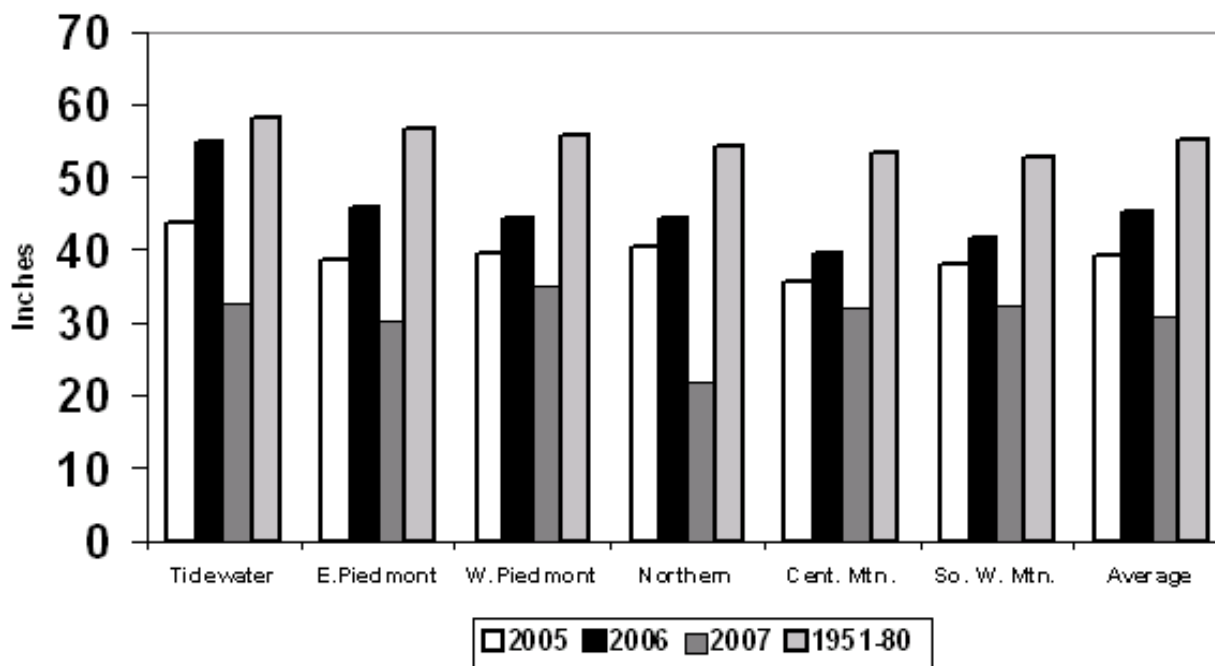
Monthly Precipitation: 2005-2007 & Normal

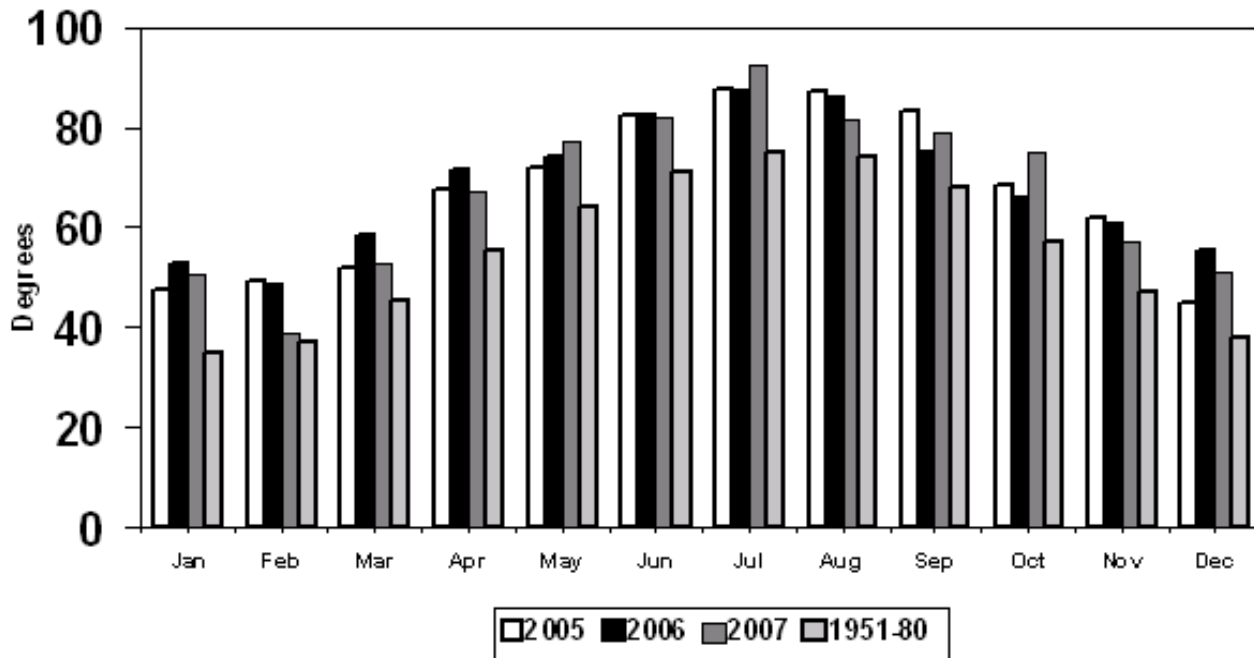


Annual Precipitation: 2005-2007 & Normal

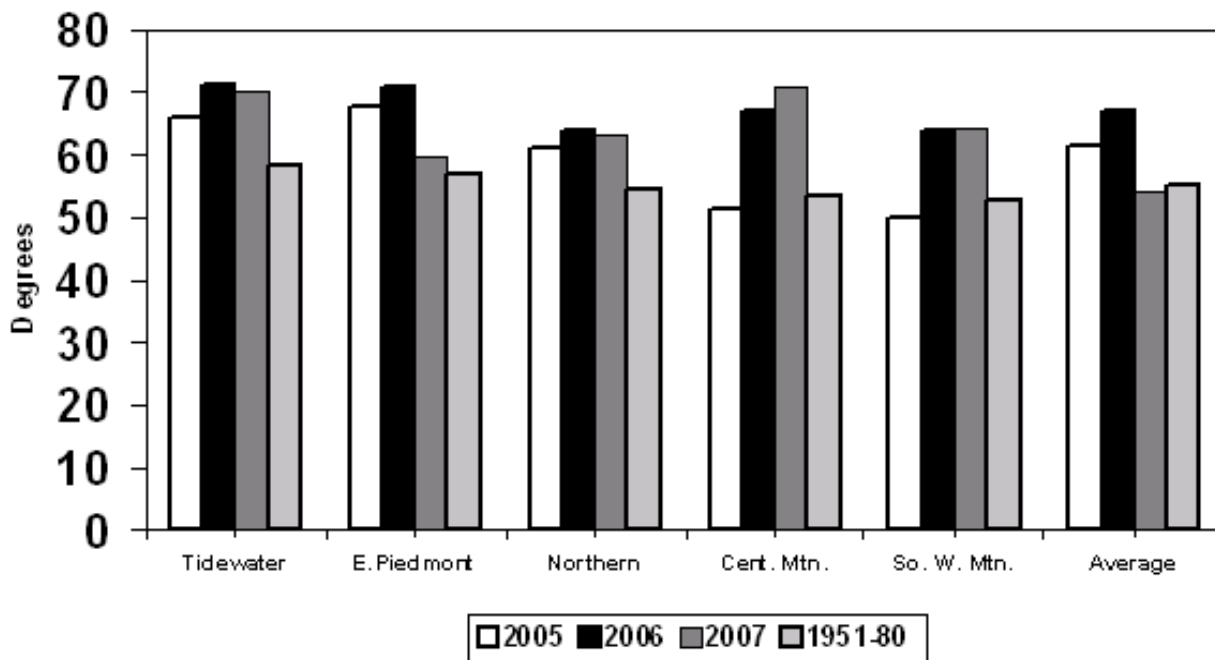
Virginia Climate District Averages

Field Crops

Crops

Weather for 2007 brought mild and dry conditions to the state. Spring began with dry conditions throughout Virginia. Periodic rains brought some relief improving soil moisture levels in some parts of the Commonwealth. Late summer conditions were hot and dry. Sporadic rains brought relief to some farmers across the state, but many crops were unable to benefit from the late season rain showers. Due to such a dry spring and summer, many crop yields were low. Corn for grain yields averaged 85 bushels per acre, down 35 bushels from the previous year's yield. Soybean yields averaged 27 bushels per acre, 4 bushel below 2006. Virginia's peanut producers harvested an average of 2,700 pounds per acre this season, down 500 pounds per acre from last year. Flue-cured tobacco yields averaged 2,280 pounds per acre, 190 pounds below the 2,470 pounds per acre harvested in 2006. Burley tobacco yield was estimated at 1,970 pounds per acre, down 30 pounds from 2006. Cotton producers had a better yield in 2007. The cotton yield was 829 pounds per acre, up 112 pounds from 2006's yield.

Prices

Soybeans, corn and peanuts had record high prices in 2007. Corn's market year average jumped up \$.98/bu to \$4.07/bu. Soybean's had an increase of \$3.96/bu to \$10.50/bu. Peanuts increased from \$16.7 cents per pound to \$21.2 cents per pound. The price increase can be attributed to increased exports and increased usage of biofuels.

Cash Receipts

Total cash receipts for Virginia field crops in 2007 at 484.4 million dollars, were up 21 percent from 2006. Cash receipts for soybeans, at 135.8 million dollars, increased 57 percent from last year and moved this commodity back to Virginia's number one cash crop. Corn cash receipts, at 101.1 million dollars, were 25 percent higher than the previous year. Cash receipts for wheat, at 64.9 million dollars, increased 62 percent from the previous year. Peanut cash receipts, at 12.0 million dollars, increased 32 percent. Tomatoes, the previous year's number one cash crop has cash receipts of 66.2 million dollars, declined 46 percent and is now number four on the list. High demand for biofuels, increased international consumption and drought conditions accounted for the increase in cash receipts

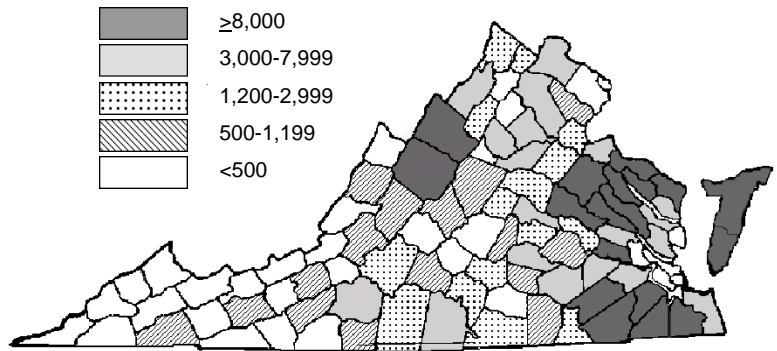

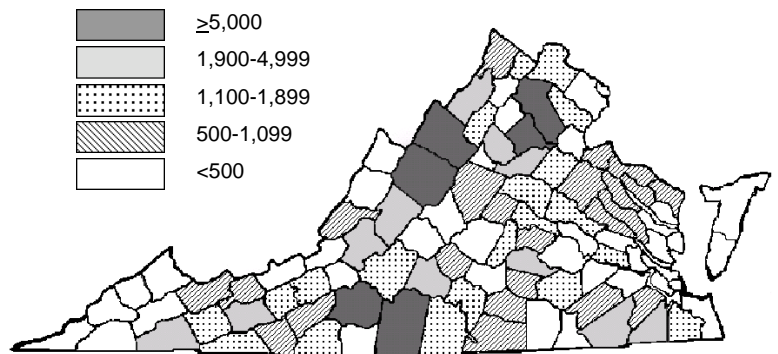

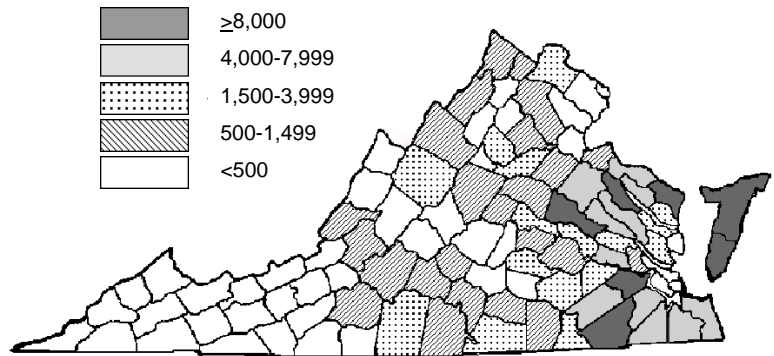


HARVESTED ACREAGE DISTRIBUTION MAPS FOR SELECTED CROPS, 2007

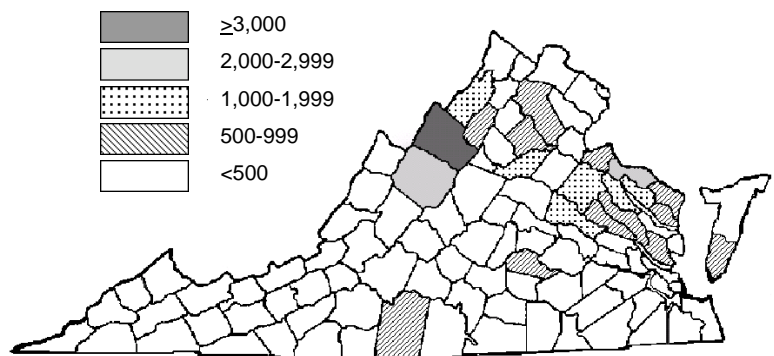

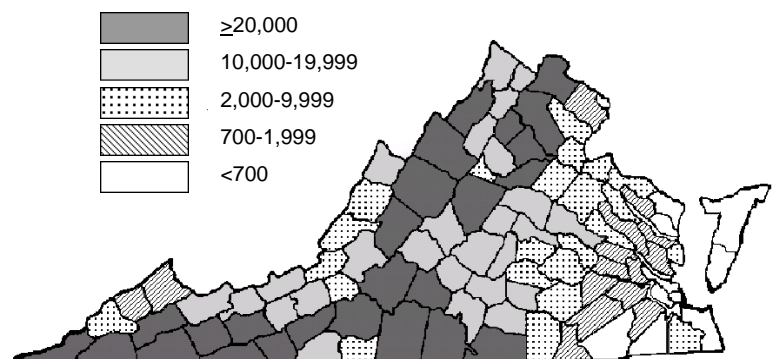

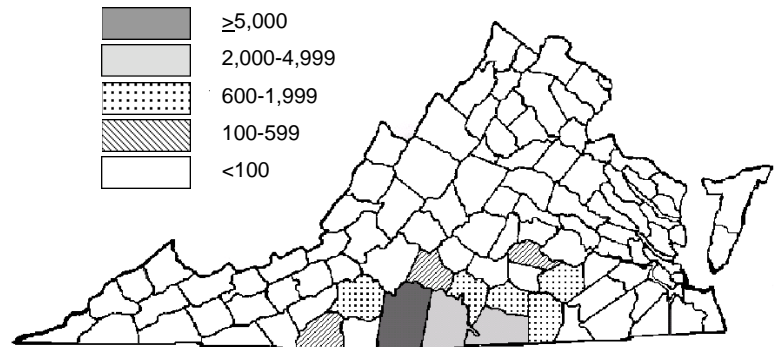


HARVESTED ACREAGE DISTRIBUTION MAPS FOR SELECTED CROPS, 2007

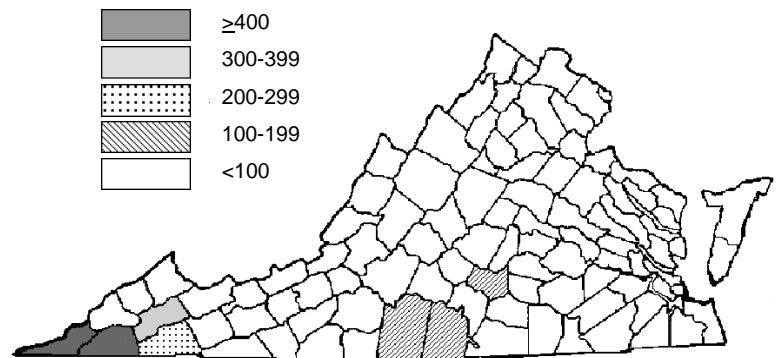

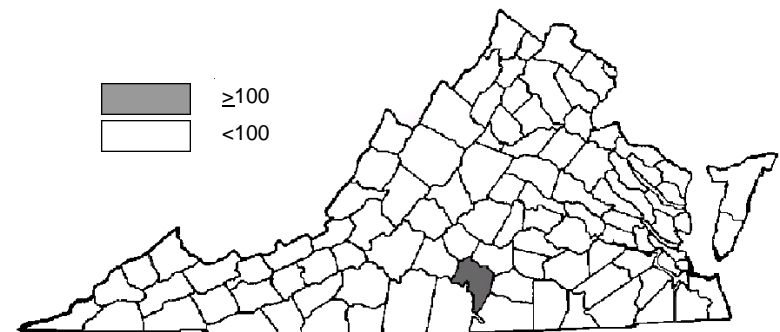

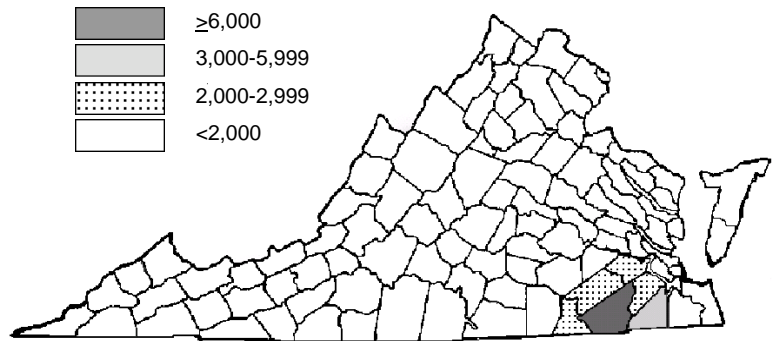


HARVESTED ACREAGE DISTRIBUTION MAPS FOR SELECTED CROPS, 2007

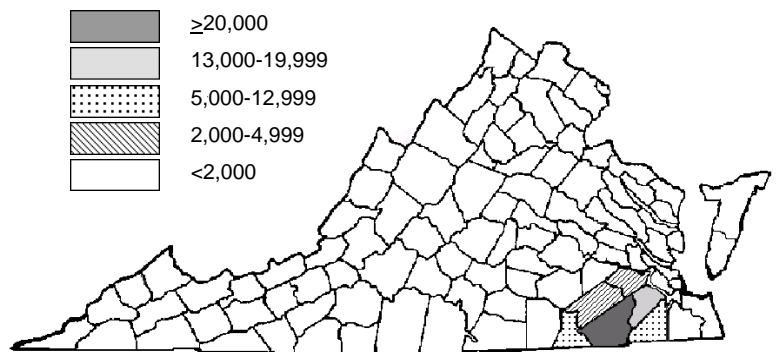

Fruits

Apples

Apple production in the Commonwealth totaled 215 million pounds in 2007, 5 million pounds less than 2006 and 35 million pounds below 2005. The growing season began with normal winter temps. Blooming was on schedule and pollination was good with a heavy fruit set. A hard freeze and frost on Easter weekend and continuing through the week caused damage in some areas. Extremely dry weather during the growing season reduced yields. Harvesting began on schedule and producers realized that yields were better than anticipated.

Peaches

The 2007 crop was devastated by late season cold weather including both heavy frost and freezing weather beginning Easter weekend and through the following week. Every agricultural area in Virginia was affected except District 5 which includes the Eastern and Southeastern counties. The fruit that remained was mostly sold locally at higher than normal prices. Growers harvested 1,600 tons of peaches in 2007 compared with 4,000 tons in 2006 and 4,700 tons in 2005.

Grapes

Grape production in Virginia decreased in 2007 with the production of Vinifera varieties accounting for the majority of

the overall production. Producers harvested a crop valued at \$7.8 million, receiving an average price of \$1,400 per ton.

Virginia ranked 8th nationally in commercial grape production and 8th for bearing acreage. Virginia's grape producers harvested 5,600 tons of commercial grapes in 2007, down 10% from the 6,200 tons produced in 2006.

Virginia bearing acreage increased from 2,100 acres in 2006 to 2,400 acres in 2007, a 14% increase over that time span.

The Chardonnay variety made up 19 percent of Virginia's total Vinifera production harvested in 2007. Also, Virginia's most popular variety accounted for 24 percent of all the Vinifera variety bearing acreage and 18 percent of the total vineyard acreage statewide. Chardonnay, Cabernet Franc, Merlot, Cabernet Sauvignon, and Vidal Blanc represented the top five varieties produced in the Commonwealth in 2007. Chardonnay producers harvested 267 tons less in 2007 compared to 2006. Cabernet Franc producers harvested 20 tons more in 2007, and Merlot producers harvested 36 tons less in 2007. Also, Cabernet Sauvignon producers harvested

15 more tons in 2007, and Vidal Blanc producers harvested 8 more tons in 2007 compared to 2006.

The 2007 growing season, from mid-January through early February, experienced colder more "normal temperatures" for the Commonwealth than previous seasons. The cold hardiness was adequate and there was little evidence of any cold injury. Spring brought some unusually warm weather, allowing buds to develop 7 to 10 days ahead of average, but in late spring there was a cold spell accompanied by snow and frost. The spring freeze killed some early buds, especially for Chardonnay, Viogner, and Chambouerein varieties. The freeze also damaged the cane and trunk tissue of some vines. The summer months were typically dry with periodic, isolated showers. Producers suffered minimum to moderate damage from the late spring freeze and were very happy with the relatively dry growing conditions during the summer months, which helped promote sugar (brix) content in grapes. The weather remained dry through the fall creating ideal conditions for late maturing red varieties. Overall, responses from producers on fruit quality were positive. The absence of tropical storms and other extreme weather during the growing season helped contribute to a quality crop in 2007.

Vegetables

Virginia vegetable producers experienced a relatively dry period during the growing season in 2007. Spring brought some unseasonably warm weather followed by dry summer months with periodic isolated showers. The weather remained dry through the fall with an absence of tropical storms and other extreme weather. Much needed rain came late in the spring and in early summer months improving the vegetable crop conditions. Virginia's fresh market vegetable producers harvested 18,500 acres of crop, valued at over \$90.9 million in 2007. These numbers compare to 18,800 acres and \$121

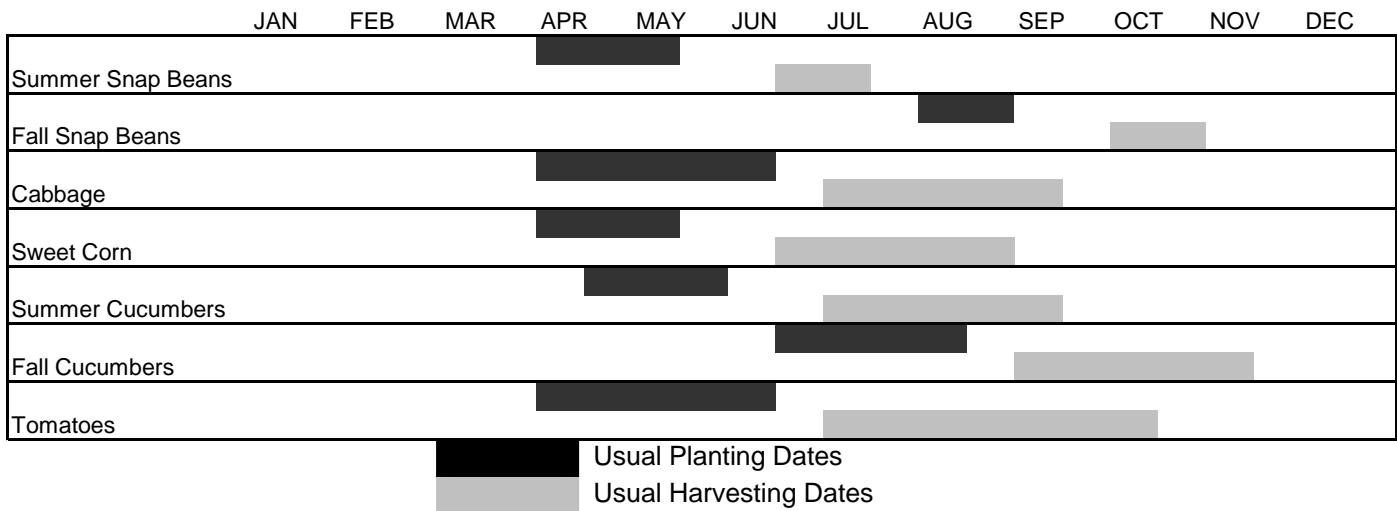
million last year. Snap beans and watermelon yields increased, while cucumber, sweet corn and tomatoes yields decreased as compared to 2006. When compared to last year, cabbage, cucumber, snap beans, and watermelon prices increased by \$3.30, \$0.60, \$3.00, and \$0.70 per hundredweight respectively. On the other hand, sweet corn price decreased by \$0.20 per hundredweight, and tomato price decreased by \$8.00 per hundredweight.

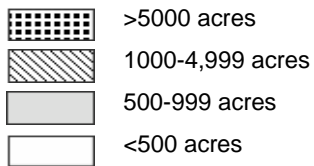

Livestock and Dairy

Cattle and Calves

Virginia's Cattle and Calf numbers decreased by 50,000 in 2007. All cattle and calves in the Commonwealth as of January 1, 2008, totaled 1.57 million head. Beef cow inventory decreased to 692,000 head compared to last year's 710,000 head. Milk cow inventory decreased by 2,000 to 98,000 head. The total inventory of cows that have calved decreased from last year to 790,000 head. In comparison to last year, milk cow replacement heifers increased by 5,000 head from the previous year, beef cow replacements increased by 2,000 head, and other heifers decreased by 12,000 head. Steers increased to 150,000, bulls remained the same, and calves decreased to 365,000 in 2007.

Milk Production

Milk Production in Virginia totaled 1.75 billion pounds in 2007. Milk produced per cow increased from last year's 17,363 pounds to 17,530 pounds in 2007. The value of milk production increased by 105,968 million dollars to 373.4 million dollars.

Sheep and Lambs

Sheep and Lamb inventory in Virginia totaled 81,000 head on January 1, 2008, up 9,000 head compared to last year. There were 1,800 farms with sheep, comprising 3 percent of the national total. Ewes one year and older totaled 50,000 head,

up 9,000 head from a year earlier. There were 12,000 replacement lambs on the first of the year, unchanged from last year. The 2007 lamb crop was 55,000 head up 6,000 head from the previous year. Sheep and lambs on feed for market slaughter 16,000 head, unchanged from previous year. Virginia was 22nd in the nation for total number of sheep.

Goats and Kids

Meat and all other goats in Virginia totaled 50,000 head, up 6,000 head compared to January 1, 2007. Milk goats totaled 3,900 head, up 100 head from a year earlier. Virginia ranks 11th in the nation for total number of meat and other goats.

Hogs and Pigs

There were 370,000 Hogs and Pigs in Virginia as of December 1, 2007. This was up 5,000 head from last year. Breeding hog inventory totaled 30,000 head and market hogs totaled 340,000 head. Market hogs inventory increased 5,000 head when compared to December 1, 2006. The 2007 pig crop totaled 549,000, up 1,000 head from last year. Sows farrowed decreased 3,000 head from the previous year at 59,000 head. The average pigs per litter were up 6 percent from last year. There were 800 farms raising hogs, 50 less compared to last year.

Poultry

Commercial Broilers

Virginia ranks 9th in the nation in broiler production. The number of broilers raised in Virginia decreased by 6.0 million from 256.2 million in 2006 to 250.2 million in 2007. Pounds produced in 2007 was 1.30 billion, down 31 million from 2006. The total value of broilers in the Commonwealth increased by 17 percent from 479.6 million dollars in 2006 to 559.4 million dollars in 2007.

Turkeys

Turkeys are Virginia's highest ranking poultry commodity with the Commonwealth ranked 4th in the nation. Turkey production increased by 500 thousand birds from 21.5 million in 2006 to 22 million in 2007. Turkey pounds produced

(Turkeys continued)

increased 4 percent in 2007 from 554.7 million pounds in 2006 to 574.2 million pounds in 2007. Total value of Virginia's turkey production increased 15 percent from 260.7 million dollars in 2006 to 298.6 million dollars in 2007.

Eggs

Virginia egg production totaled 794 million in 2007, down 12 million from the 806 million eggs produced in 2006. The value of egg production went from 66.8 million dollars in 2006 to 79.0 million dollars in 2007, an 18 percent increase. Producers averaged \$1.19 per dozen of eggs, which is up \$0.20 from 2006. Virginia ranks 28th in the U.S in egg production.

Trout

Production

Virginia's 2007 Commercial Trout Production was valued at 1,513,000 dollars. This is up 3 percent from the 1,475,000 dollars in 2007. This ranks Virginia 9th nationally in value of trout sold (excluding eggs).

Sales

Foodsize trout sold totaled 630,000 pounds, down 11,000 pounds from 641,000 pounds in 2006. The average value per pound for foodsize trout, at \$2.17, was 16 cents above the 2006 price. Foodsize trout account for the largest portion of the Commonwealth's trout sales. Recreational and fee fishing was the biggest sales outlet for foodsize trout.

Loss

There were 786,000 trout lost in 2007, up 485,000 from 2006. The top two categories were 48 percent lost to predators and 37 percent lost to disease.

Honey

Production

Virginia had 6,000 producing colonies in 2007, down from 8,000 in 2006. Honey price increased from \$2.27 per pound in 2006 to \$2.35 per pound in 2007. Honey production (from producers with at least 5 colonies) totaled 276,000 pounds in 2007, down 60,000 pounds from the previous year. Yield per colony was 46 pounds in 2007, up from 42 pounds per colony in 2006. Stocks in 2007 equaled about 23 percent of production, down from 34 percent last year.

U.S.

U.S. honey production in 2007 from producers with five or more colonies totaled 148 million pounds, down 4 percent from 2006. There were 2.44 million colonies producing honey in 2007, up 2 percent from 2006. Yield per colony averaged 60.8 pounds, down 6 percent from the 64.7 pounds in 2006. Colonies which produced honey in more than one State were counted in each State where the honey was produced. Therefore, yields per colony may be understated, but total production would not be impacted. Colonies were not included if honey was not harvested. Producer honey stocks were 52.5 million pounds on December 15, 2007, down 13 percent from a year earlier.
