

Weather Summary- For the week ending April 13, 2025

A cold front had just moved over West Virginia the day before the week began, so Monday began much colder than usual for this time of year. Most lowland counties were issued freeze warnings early in the day. A few clouds and showers continued to clear out to the east. Tuesday morning was also much colder than normal under clear skies, and again, freeze warnings were issued. For the rest of the day, most of the state was clear under high pressure. Wednesday began cold, with most of the state in the mid-20s, and warmed to near normal under mostly sunny skies. A quick warm front, followed by another cold front, produced showers and a few storms on Thursday. On Friday, a disturbance kept clouds and a few showers around, and the temperatures remained below normal. Saturday began cloudy, with showers over the eastern mountains, but cleared out in the afternoon. Sunday had a few showers and warmed before the next cold front. All stations were colder than usual.

Temperatures: Williamson had the highest recorded temperature of 68 degrees. Elkins had the lowest recorded temperature of 21 degrees. The state average temperature was 42 degrees.

Precipitation: Marlinton had the highest recorded amount of precipitation with 0.79 inches. Parkersburg had the lowest recorded amount of precipitation with 0.09 inches. The state average precipitation was 0.33 inches.

Drought Conditions: Abnormally dry (D0) conditions over eastern mountains. Moderate drought (D1) and severe drought $(D\overline{2})$ over the Eastern Panhandle.
