

#### Weather Summary- For the week ending May 4, 2025

West Virginia began the week under high pressure. With plenty of sunshine and comfortable temperatures topping out around 80 degrees, Monday was a textbook spring day. Tuesday began clear, but clouds began to form in the late morning ahead of an approaching cold front. Showers and storms began in the afternoon and continued into early Wednesday. By the time the sun rose on Wednesday, most of the precipitation was out of the area and the day became mostly sunny and warm. Another cold front brought showers and thunderstorms (some severe) for Thursday. Friday and the weekend were dominated by a low-pressure area over the Midwest that brought waves of unsettled weather into the state. Overall, West Virginia was warm and wet this week.

**<u>Temperatures</u>**: Moorefield and Keyser had the highest recorded temperature of 89 degrees. White Sulphur Springs had the lowest recorded temperature of 34 degrees. The state average temperature was 66 degrees.

**<u>Precipitation</u>**: Charles Town had the highest recorded amount of precipitation with 2.44 inches. Moorefield had the lowest recorded amount of precipitation with 0.73 inches. The state average precipitation was 1.55 inches.

**Drought Conditions:** Abnormally dry (D0) conditions over eastern mountains. Moderate drought (D1) over the Eastern Panhandle and a small area of severe drought (D2) in the extreme Eastern Panhandle.
