
<u>Agricultural News:</u> Days suitable for fieldwork were 4.4. Weather conditions were cooler with some rain. High temperatures were in the 80s. Farming activities this week included fixing fences and planting corn and soybeans. Some pastures that were grazed early are showing signs of stress. There are abnormally dry to severe drought conditions in the State.

Weather Summary- For the week ending May 11, 2025

An upper-level low pressure system settled in over top of West Virginia on Monday. This created showers and thunderstorms throughout the day. Some thunderstorms produced hail. The upper level low slowly moved away on Tuesday, but still produced some afternoon showers and thunderstorms. Wednesday was mostly sunny and cool under high pressure. Another cold front crossed on Thursday, creating more unsettled weather. The temperatures on Friday were much cooler on the back side of the cold front and some precipitation fell over the Eastern Panhandle as the system moved out. Saturday and Sunday were dry with a warming trend. This week ended with West Virginia being cooler than usual and mostly drier than normal.

<u>Temperatures</u>: Williamson had the highest recorded temperature of 87 degrees. Elkins had the lowest recorded temperature of 32 degrees. The state average temperature was 59 degrees.

<u>Precipitation:</u> Keyser had the highest recorded amount of precipitation with 1.52 inches. Bluefield had the lowest recorded amount of precipitation with 0.05 inches. The state average precipitation was 0.57 inches.

<u>Drought Conditions</u>: Abnormally dry (D0) conditions over eastern mountains. Moderate drought (D1) over the Eastern Panhandle and a small area of severe drought (D2) in the extreme Eastern Panhandle.
