

Weather Summary- For the week ending May 25, 2025

Monday began the week under high pressure, with minimal clouds, no precipitation, and near normal temperatures across West Virginia. As a low pressure system to the west moved north on Tuesday, rain began early and continued as a soaking rain all through the day. Rain, heavy at times, continued into Wednesday. The main cold front crossed over the Mountain State late Wednesday morning, creating more showers and thunderstorms. Flash flooding was reported. The remnants from the front, and the main area of low pressure slowly moved out of the area during the day on Thursday, dragging the showers and storms with it. The weather cleared out early on Friday, ushering in cooler and dryer air for the weekend. Saturday was cooler than normal and dry under high pressure. Clouds slowly moved in on Sunday ahead of a front approaching from the south, and rains began late Sunday into Monday. Overall, the week was cool with periods of rain.

<u>Temperatures</u>: Williamson had the highest recorded temperature of 82 degrees. Elkins and Terra Alta had the lowest recorded temperature of 37 degrees. The state average temperature was 58 degrees.

<u>Precipitation:</u> Terra Alta had the highest recorded amount of precipitation with 1.80 inches. Creston had the lowest recorded amount of precipitation with 0.29 inches. The state average precipitation was 0.82 inches.

<u>Drought Conditions</u>: Small area of abnormally dry (D0) and moderate drought (D1) in the Eastern Panhandle.
